

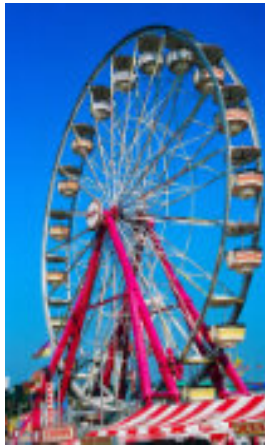

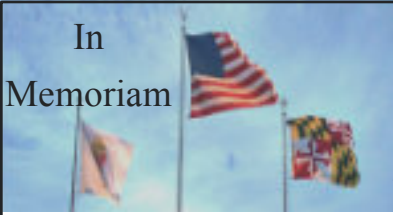

He got his start with the fair as a vendor for the Glen Burnie Farmer's Co-Op. He fell in love with the fair and so began a long relationship. John was an agricultural person who believed in the Fair's mission to teach children about farming, growing and animals. John inspired many young people to become involved with the Fair and 4-H. After working for the Co-Op for many years he went to work for Meyers Seed of Baltimore from 1988 until

August 10th, 2020. He loved to give back to the community and had an amazing knowledge of plant diseases and pests and he would communicate with a wide group of people throughout Maryland. He was also the past Vice President and President of MAAFS. He was voted Fair Person Of The Year. He was a long-time volunteer and supporter of 4-H, FFA, and the Maryland Farm Bureau. John met his wife, Debbie Wolford, at the Fair and later married at the Fairgrounds. He was a loving husband, brother, son, uncle and friend. He will be truly missed.

Daniel "Danny" White loved the Anne Arundel County fair. He believed in the power of connection, laughter, family, and friendship and the fair was the perfect place for all of those things. Roger Westphal

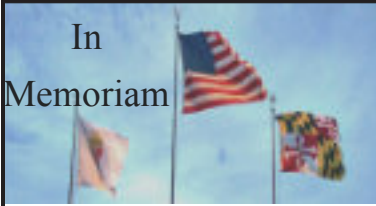

No horse will be allowed to pull in a heavyweight class that has pulled in the lightweight class. All horses will be subject to a drug test if needed. The Sport of Ring JoustingA traditional ring joust -- a test of skill and horsemanship where riders pass through a series of arches, attempting to spear three dangling rings and present them to the judges.

There are three regulation rides for three rings, allowing a knight or maid to capture nine rings for a perfect score. Starting ring diameters range from one and three quarter inches for novices to one inch for professional jousters. Tie-off rides can be conducted with rings as small as one quarter inch in diameter.



Jousting is a sport synonymous with Maryland history. It has survived in Maryland since the founding of the original colony.

The History of 4-H

4-H didn't start at any one time or place. It is the result of the work of many people in different parts of the United States who were concerned about young people. From its inception, 4-H tied both public and private resources together for the purpose of helping young people. Two forces generated the idea of 4-H work. One was the concern for education in rural areas. The seed of the 4-H idea of practical or applied educational principles resulted from the concern for the relevance of public schools to county life. The second was a need for advancing the new agricultural technologies produced by research at experiment stations of the land grant college system. The farming community did not readily accept these new ideas and techniques. When Congress created the Cooperative Extension Service at the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) in 1914, it included boys' and girls' club work. This soon became known as 4-H clubs – Head, Heart, Hands and Health. As 4-H neared its 50th Anniversary, it began to experience several trends. In 1948, a group of American young people went to Europe and a group of Europeans came to the United States on the first International Farm Youth Exchange. Out of state trips and international Exchanges have been highly educational for hundreds of young people in 4-H. 4-H began to extend into urban areas in the 1950's. Later, the basic 4-H focus became the personal growth of the member. Life skills development is built into 4-H projects, activities and events. To help participants become contributing, productive, self-directed members of society. The organizational coordination changed in the 1960's, combining 4-H groups divided by gender or race into a single, integrated program. Today, after 100 years, 4-H is the largest, out-school youth program in the United States both in rural and urban areas throughout the country. It offers youth opportunities in communications, leadership, career development, animal and plant science, home improvement and technology, and much more to nearly 7 million American youth. The program promotes life skills development through an expanding number of delivery modes: 4-H community clubs, special interest groups, EFNEP programs, school enrichment, camping and more. 4-H will continue to grow and develop with the head, heart, hands, and health of youth.
