Some of his early entries included baked goods, vegetables, leather crafts and photography. His first volunteer efforts were as a 4-Her and included helping with entry day, delivery of ice to vendors and directing parking at the old westing house lot. As the Fair moved to its current location and Dan became an adult, it was easy for him to transition from a 4-H volunteer to a Fair member! In the 1980 catalog, Dan was listed as purchasing agent. This was when the Fair was still held at Sandy Point. When the Fair moved to Crownsville, Dan helped his dad with the Bicycle Rodeo and helped his mom and dad with the Farm and Garden Department. Dan served in the Army from 1984-1986 and when discharged resumed his volunteer efforts with Fair events and activities. He was even the director of Halloween Happening. He served on the Board, rental committee and took on the job of parking by providing a cadre of volunteers to park cars for many years. Dan became Chair of the Farm and Garden Department after his parents passed away. Lisa and Dan took on the holiday volunteer dinner for many years when Marie Gish stepped back. They also took on the Pie eating contest until his passing. So many Fair members watched Dan as he grew up at the Fair. Dan returned each year to volunteer and he brought with him a seemingly endless supply of happy, hard-working volunteers, many of whom were family and friends. They and Dan will never be forgotten because of the many things they did and taught us to do. We lost a precious gift when we lost Danny Overstreet, a volunteer hero! The Fair is thankful for all Dan did and for leaving us his wonderful wife Lisa, his friends and family to help carry his spirit as they volunteer at the Fair. Thank you Dan for all the wonderful memories.



Ruby Schwin

Many folks knew Ruby Schwin as the Chair of the Indoor Building or remember her as the 4-H Program Assistant, always there at the 4-H desk, willing to answer a question or share a story. However, her love of the fair and 4-H goes way back...Ruby Schwin was instrumental in the development of and served as the first club leader of the Anne Arundel Dairy Leasing Club. This was the first time in 4-H history, members leased dairy animals from a private herd, then the United States Naval Academy Dairy Farm, worked with them and showed them as their own. Ruby was very involved in getting the club up and running, and leading the club, along with many other events held there at the Dairy Farm. One volunteer said it was two years before she ever saw Ruby NOT behind a table volunteering! Ruby worked tirelessly for 4-H, the Maryland State Fair and our own Anne Arundel County Fair. Although Ruby's 4-H title was Program Assistant, there were many years when she ran the County 4-H program, because there was no one else. She did her best to see that everything ran accordingly to plan, and volunteers will always ready to help her see things got done. When the Teen Leaders decided they wanted to have an Interstate Exchange, Ruby worked with the teens to make it happen. As for the fairs, how many remember Animal World at State Fair? Ruby, would help gather farm animals from all over the state, so that youth who attending the fair would get a first hand look at a cow, a sheep, a llama, ducklings, chicks, anything she could bring to the fair. She then stayed there day and night with those animals, overseeing the teens who cared for them for them during the day. At the County Fair, Ruby was usually running the 4-H Department, when there was no 4-H educator, and was always a staple of the Indoor Building! She loved to see the kids with their projects and animals, always interested in what they were doing and how they were doing. She was always there to see that all the kids got to participate in their activities, whether 4-H, FFA or the general public. She was always thinking about new things for them to do or enter. Ruby was true testament to the volunteer spirit of 4-H and the Anne Arundel County Fair. She leaves a legacy of kindness and volunteerism, we should all strive to emulate.




Sunday Performer Anna Stamato



FAIRGROUNDS AND EXHIBITOR RULES AND REGULATIONS GENERAL INFORMATION

Online Entry System

Enter ONLINE by AUGUST 25th. Entries also accepted at check in. Visit aacountyfair.org for the details.

Section A Exhibit Hall Regulations and Administration for Exhibitors

- 1. Every entry/exhibit in the Exhibit Building shall be under the control of the Anne Arundel County Fair, Inc. during the Fair. While every possible precaution will be taken for the safekeeping of exhibits, the Anne Arundel County Fair, Inc. shall in no case be responsible for any loss or damage which may occur from any cause. Exhibitor(s) accept the preceding conditions as set forth when entering their exhibit(s).
- 2. All OPEN Departments are divided into three age groups: ADULT 18 and over, TEEN13 17 and Youth 12 and under.
- 3. All entries/exhibits will be accepted as follows:
 - a. Sunday, September 8th, from 2 p.m. 5 p.m. All OPEN Classes except Baked Goods, Farm and Garden and Herbs.
 - b. Monday, September 9th, from 2 p.m. 7 pm All OPEN Classes.
 - c. Monday, September 16th, from 2 p.m. 7p.m. Release Day. All entries/exhibits MUST be picked up within time.
 - 4. Entries/Exhibits must be the work and bona fide property of the exhibitor and shown in the exhibitor's name.
 - 5. Entries/Exhibits must be clean, fresh, and conform to the department's specifications.
 - 6. Entries/Exhibits must not have been shown in the Fair before and must have been completed since the last year's fair.
 - 7. Exhibitor may only enter one (1) item per class.
 - 8. All articles entered for competition will be entered by an Exhibitor Number and Name. No information on the identity of the exhibitor will be made until all judging processes, including Best of Show Awards are complete.
 - 9. Exhibitor forms and tags should contain the exhibitor's full name, address, zip code & telephone numbers. The use of preprinted address labels is encouraged.
 - 10. All exhibitors are strongly encouraged to try the new ONLINE ENTRY SYSTEM. Persons who plan to exhibit ten (10) items or more in any department may contact the Exhibit Building Chair or Department Chair to pick up entry tags and/or forms one week prior to entry day.
 - 11. The Anne Arundel Country Fair, Inc. reserves the right to decline any entry/exhibit.
 - 12. Any false statement in regard to any entry/exhibit shall be grounds to exclude the exhibitor from award and further competition.
 - 13. Chairpersons will receive and place entries/exhibits in their departments with the help of fair members and volunteers.
 - 14. Chairpersons will have the care and complete supervision of their departments.
 - 15. Disputes not settled by the Department Chair will be decided by a committee of three (3) consisting of the Department Chair, the Exhibit Hall Manager, and the Fair Manager/ Assistant Fair Manager.
 - 16. Due to potential space problems The Anne Arundel County Fair reserves the right to limit exhibits if full capacity is reached.
 - 17. Once judged, no entry/exhibit will be allowed to be removed from the Exhibit Hall.
 - 18. Department Chairs entries accepted 30 minutes prior to opening.

Section B Premiums, Ribbons and Other Awards

- 1. Entries/Exhibits must be made in compliance with the premium list with which all premiums will be awarded.
- 2. All premiums awarded at the Fair will be payable to the exhibitor. Premiums and entries/exhibits not claimed by the FIRST FULL WEEKEND IN OCTOBER will be considered to be a donation to the Anne Arundel Country Fair, Inc.
- 3. Premiums: 1st Place \$5.00, 2nd Place \$3.00, 3rd Place \$1.00.
- 4. Champion ribbons may be given in selected categories, at discretion of judges and/or department chair.
- 5. Best in Show awards for indoor entries will be presented at a ceremony held on Sunday at 4 PM. Best in show winners are requested to be present to accept the award. The winner will be admitted to the fair free of charge; one adult per YOUTH winner will also be admitted free of charge.
- 6. Best in Show Awards and Special Awards (listed in Section D) cannot be won more than three (3) consecutive years by the same person. After a period of one year that person would again be eligible for said Best in Show or Special Award. If an entry does not fall under any of the categories listed in the catalog, it is not eligible for competition and is not eligible for a cash premium, but may be displayed if the exhibitor chooses and there is adequate room to do so.
- 7. Exhibitor must be an Anne Arundel County Resident to be awarded a Best In Show Award.

Section C Judging

- 1. The decision of the judge(s) is final.
- 2. No exhibitor shall attempt to interfere with the judging process in any manner subject to forfeiture of any and all awards.
- 3. Judge(s) will not award any article a premium unless, in their opinion, it is so merited.
- 4. Articles to be judged at a time and place designated by the Anne Arundel County Fair, Inc.
- 5. When there is but one exhibit in a class, the judge(s) will award only the premium merited in the opinion of the judge(s).
- 6. The classification/category of any item for exhibit may be changed at the discretion of the judges. Items for exhibit must meet all the specifications for entry as set forth in this catalog and may be disqualified if they do not meet these standards.

Section D Special Awards

- 5. The FOLGER M. RIDOUT AWARD is presented to the Best In Show Adult in the Flower Department.
- 6. The ANNA E. SNYDER AWARD is presented to the Best In Show Adult in the Herb Department.
- 7. The COMMANDER MUMFORD AWARD is presented to the Best In Show Adult in the Honey Department.
- 8. The OSCAR F. GRIMES AGRICULTURAL PRIDE AWARD will be chosen from the Best In Show Adult of the following departments: Farm and Garden, Flower, Herbs and Honey.
- 9. The MARIE E GISH AWARD is presented to the Best of the Youth and Teen Best in Show winners.
- 10. THE CHESAPEAKE TREASURES CHAPTER OF THE SMOCKING ARTS GUILD OF AMERICA NEEDLE ARTS AWARD is presented to the Best in Show Adult in the Needle Arts department.
- 11. The JOHN C. KOZENSKI JR KINDNESS AWARD is presented by the Anne Arundel County 4-H Foundation to a 4-H member who has been chosen for their outstanding qualities while volunteering during the county fair in the poultry barn.
- 12. THE VELMA AND TOM TRIMMER MEMORIAL SEWING AWARD is awarded to the overall Best In Show winner in the Sewing Department.

Section E Fairgrounds and Exhibit Building Rules

- 1. The Anne Arundel County Fair, Inc. reserves the right to cancel any event or contest without notice at any time prior to the actual holding thereof, without liability except for return of any entry fee.
- No bicycles, skateboard, roller blades, roller skates, shoe skates, or scooters will be allowed on the Fairgrounds except for scheduled events.
- 3. No one, other than Fair authorized personnel, will be allowed in the Exhibit Building during the judging of exhibits.
- 4. During the week of the fair, NO pets, exotic animals, outside alcohol, drugs, firearms, or coolers are allowed on the fairgrounds.

Section F Appeal Process

- 1. Questions not covered by rules and regulations shall be decided by the Fair Week Committee. All protests must be made in writing, must plainly state the complaint, be accompanied by a fee of Ten Dollars (\$10), and delivered to the Fair Week Manager within forty eight (48) hours following the judging of the classin dispute. Should the protest not be sustained, the ten dollar (\$10) fee shall be forfeited to the Anne Arundel County Fair, Inc.
- 2. The decision of the Fair Week Committee is final.



- 3. **LIDS & SEALS:** Lids and rings must be free of mold and rust. No paraffin is to be used. All entries must be processed, sealed and shelf stable, except dried foods and refrigerator pickles. No Tattler Lids Accepted.
- LABELS: All jars must have labels identifying: 1. Product 2. Date Canned/Dried 3. Type of Processing (Use the following *LETTERS* to denote the type of processing: *HW* Hot Water Bath, *P* Pressure Canner,
 S Steam Bath, *D* Dried). Labels **MAY NOT** cover full lid. No recipes are required.
- 5. All dried foods, jellies, jams, preservatives, conserves, chutneys, fruit butters, marmalades, pickles and relishes may be opened for judging, if more than one entry exist per class; or at the judge's discretion. Judge's reserve the right to sample canned goods, if it seems necessary in order to make the best decision. Open jars will be marked on the lid.
- 6. Judge's may disqualify jars which appear to contain artificial coloring (except mint or pepper jelly) and entries with artificial flavoring added. They may eliminate jars if the liquid is lower than levels suggested in the Ball Book. (i.e. 1" for beets, corn, peas, pie fillings, and low acid foods, etc. . ½" for fruit and acid vegetables, pickles, relishes, and juices and ¼" for soft spreads, jams, conserves and jellies, etc.)
- 7. Miscellaneous means not otherwise specified in the class category.
- 8. Commercially canned products will be automatically disqualified.
- 9. Basis for judging fruits, vegetable and meats.







- 1. All honey and beeswax must be the property of the exhibitor and produced within the 15 month period prior to entry.
- 2. All honey exhibited must have been gathered and ripened in a natural way by the honeybee.
- 3. Exhibitor's name/label will not be allowed on any entry (**Exception:** Class E1/E2 small labels with the exhibitor number will be secured to the bottom of the entries to avoid errors when exhibits are judged.)
- 4. All extracted honey must be exhibited in 1 lb. glass or clear plastic, flat faced standard honey jars. (**Exception**: Beekeepers entering for the first time may exhibit honey in any clear glass container, 8oz. min.).
- 5. Any exhibitor who wishes information as to how their exhibit was placed by the judges may receive this information by consulting with the Superintendent.
- 6. All exhibitors are limited to one entry per class, but multiple entries per household are allowed and will be judged independently. Only the highest ranked entry per household will be awarded a ribbon/premium.

Class Rules:

- 1. **Section A Class ALL:** Educational exhibits should depict the importance of honeybees to mankind. The display should be 3D; printed material should be readable from 4' away. Min width 3' and Max height is 5'. **Honey displays** must include products of the hive and may have pictures and/or charts. No beekeeper's equipment, tools, observation hives, bakery products, canned goods, or honey in tins. Min width 3' and Max height is 5'.
- 2. **Section B Class ALL:** The Superintendent of the Honey Department will determine, at the time of entry, the color of all extracted honey. The Superintendent/Judge(s) reserves the right to change the class selected, if so deemed.
- 3. **Section B Class 7:** All chunk and finely granulated honey entries must be exhibited in round wide mouth 1 lb. glass honey jars. Plastic jars are not acceptable for this entry.
- 4. **Section B Class 8, 9, 10:** All entries of comb honey must be wrapped in clear cellophane or placed in window cartons.
- 5. **Section B Class 11:** One frame of honey must be supported vertically in a sealed rigid frame holder or case with transparent windows for viewing the entire comb portion. The frame holder will not be judged.
- 6. **Section B Class 12:** First time exhibitors may exhibit honey in any clear glass container 8 fluid ounces minimum, 3 jars.
- 7. **Section D Class ALL:** All candles/wax entries must be wrapped in clear cellophane or exhibited in protective boxes with clear plastic tops.
- 8. **Section D Class 5:** Fancy beeswax, is defined as artistic or decorative wax product that has been manipulated, carved or formed in some way by the exhibitor; it should be crafted and not molded in a single process.
- 9. **Section E Class ALL:** Open category. Entries may include items such as gift packs, artwork, photographs, arts and crafts, and lotions or soaps.
- 10. Section E Classes 1, 2: Gift arrangements/packs, must include one or more products of the hive

and may include items that enhance the appeal or promote the use of hive products. Products do not have to be made by an exhibitor. Mailable gift packs must be displayed in a container with materials suitable for shipping. Personal gift arrangements should be suitable for personal use and in a box, basket or other suitable container.

- 11. Section E Class 3: A list of ingredients must accompany all entries.
- 12. **Section E Class 7:** Pictures must be at a minimum 5"x7", mounted on an 8"x10" cardboard or a photo mounting board, pertaining to beekeeping. No frames for easier display.
- 13. **Section E Class 8:** Beekeeping Essay, should convey a story or message pertaining to beekeeping and must contain at least 4, but not more than 7 photographs. Must be mounted together on a poster/foam board.
- 14. **Section E Class 10:** Bee-related Gadgets, must have information on what it is used for and how to use it and the cost.



GENERAL RULES FOR ALL LIVESTOCK

- 1. Exhibitors must comply with the State of Maryland Health Regulations for livestock & submit a copy of the Maryland Veterinary Health Certificate with all entries.
- 2. Priority will be given to Anne Arundel County residents and previous out-of-county exhibitors.
- Entries must be entered via the online entry system by September 1 at 11:59 p.m. NO late entries will be accepted. Entry
 fees will be processed online.
- 4. Stalls and pens will be allotted on a space available basis. Check in time is Tuesday of Fair Week from 3:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. Check out is Sunday of Fair Week at 6:30 p.m. Nothing should be removed from the pens/stall/barn prior to this time. Early dismissal is **NOT** permitted. **All** livestock exhibitors must have their pens/stalls checked for cleanliness before leaving the fair-grounds upon checkout or they risk forfeiting premiums.
- 5. Substitutions will be allowed if ownership is identical with the original entry.
- 6. Where there is 1 animal in a class, award will depend upon merit of the animal and is left to the discretion of the judge.
- 7. Exhibitors will be expected to comply with the arrival, release and show times specified for their respective departments.
- 8. All animals must be owned by the exhibitor at least 60 days prior to check in date or be a Fair approved leasing program. All groups of animals must be owned by the exhibitor if shown as such.
- 9. No exhibitor can win more than two monies in one class. No more than two entries or exhibits per class.
- 10. Registration and health certificates must be furnished and available anytime during the Fair. Certificates will be checked prior to check in
- 11. All animals must be registered in the name of exhibitor. In order to be eligible for the group classes, animals must be entered and shown in their respective individual classes. Animals cannot be cross entered or in market/breeding classes.
- 12. Sanitary conditions must be maintained in the barns, wash rack and tie out areas at all times.
- 13. Cattle tie-out times are from the time the fair closes until one hour before the fair opens the next day. Animals are to be ready for viewing one hour later.
- 14. NO walking of animals during the time the fair is open is allowed with the exception of to and from the wash rack
- 15. Initial bedding will be provided or bring your own Fair approved bedding. Additional bedding will be for sale at Fairgrounds. All exhibitors are responsible for the cleaning of pens/stalls. Premiums will be withheld for noncompliance.
- 16. The Anne Arundel County Fair reserves the right to send any animal home that they believe should not be shown or exhibited.
- 17. Participants must comply with the Rules & Regulations listed for each department, division and class.
- 18. Noncompliance with any rules or directives may result in forfeiture of premiums & expulsion.
- 19. The Anne Arundel County Fair extends the privilege to 4H/FFA exhibitors to compete in the open division of livestock classes.
- 20. The right to modify and/or cancel any division or classis reserved by the Anne Arundel County Fair Week Committee
- 21. 4-H and 4-H Volunteer cards and green clover wrist bands provided through the AACo Extension Office are considered passes to the Anne Arundel County Fair.
- 22. Exhibitors are limited to 6 head of cattle per breed and 10 sheep or goats per breed.
- 23. The Anne Arundel County Fair reserves the right to cancel any event or contest without notice at any time without liability.
- 24. Management assumes no responsibility for loss or damage from any causes.
- 25. During fair week, **NO** pets or exotic animals, **NO** Drugs and **NO** Fire Arms allowed on fairgrounds.
- 26. Slick Shearing of sheep and goats is **PROHIBITED** unless **PRE-APPROVED** as a demonstration.
- 27. Goats must be shown with smooth chain collars only. No training collars allowed.
- 28. Only approved volunteers are allowed in the show ring.
- 29. Animal health inspections will occur at check-in and throughout the time the animals are at the fair. If an animal is found to have a contagious disease and needs to be sent home a committee of 3 will make the decision out of this list of fair personnel. Fair President, Fair Week Manager, Barn Supervisor, Species chairperson, 4-H and/or FFA Advisor. A veterinarian or government animal health inspector can make the decision alone if present.

CHAIRPERSONS

1. Chairperson will have care and complete supervision of their departments and ensure all rules and regulations are followed.

JUDGES

- 1. All decisions of the judges will be final.
- 2. No exhibitor shall attempt to interfere with the judges in any manner, subject to forfeiture of any or all awards.
- 3. Judges will not award any animal a premium unless in their opinion it is so merited.
- 4. Animals will be judged at a time and place designated by the Fair Association.
- 5. When there is but one exhibitor in a class the judges will award only the premium merited in the opinion of the judges.

GRIEVANCE PROCESS

- 1. All protest must be made in writing, must state plainly the complaint, be accompanied by a fee of \$10, and must be delivered to the Fair Week Manager or Barn Area Supervisor within 48 hours following the judging of the class or incident in dispute.
- 2. The grievance committee is omprimes of 3 or more of the following: Fair President, Fair Vice President, Fair Week Manager, Barn Superintendent, Species chairperson, and the appropriate 4-H and FFA leaders as needed.

2024 MARYLAND ANIMAL HEALTH FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS

The Maryland Department of Agriculture's (MDA), Animal Health Program strives to safeguard Maryland's animal industries at our fairs and shows. With an increased potential of disease transmission occurring when large numbers of animals gather for exhibition, MDA has set forth requirements for exhibitors to follow at Maryland fairs and shows. As an exhibitor, you can help reduce the potential risk of introduction and spread of infectious and/or contagious diseases by following the species-specific health requirements below.

IMPORTANT 2024 ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS TO MENTION:

1. CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION (CVI):

> The accredited veterinarian is required to send the original (white and canary) copies to MDA Headquarters within 7 days of completion.

2. LIVESTOCK:

- > All cattle and swine must have an EID (electronic identification) or RFID (radio frequency identification) 840 tag. Cattle and swine with non-electronic ID tags will be dismissed upon entry.
- > All sheep and goats must have Scrapie Identification in the form of an official Scrapie Identification tag, or a legible and healed tattoo matching identification on breed registration paperwork.
- > Livestock petting zoos and pony rides will be allowed with proper CVI, indicating rabies vaccination status, and self-certification documents.

3. POULTRYAVIAN INFLUENZA TESTING:

- > All in- state poultry must be tested for avian influenza within 30 days prior to the exhibition or originate from an NPIP U.S. H5/H7 Avian Influenza Clean flock.
- > All out-of-state poultry must be tested for avian influenza within 21 days prior to the exhibition or originate from an NPIP U.S. H5/H7 Avian Influenza Clean flock.

Maryland Law provides penalties for violations of Animal Health Law and Regulations.

LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY FAILING TO MEET COMPLETE DOCUMENTATION OF ALL REQUIREMENTS WILL BE DENIED ENTRY OR REMOVED FROM THE EXHIBITION, - "REJECTED." SEE ANIMAL REJECTION POLICY UNDER GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITORS.

REQUIREMENTS FOR SPONSORS OF A LIVESTOCK/POULTRY EXHIBITION (COMAR 15.11.14.05)

- 1. **Notification**: Exhibit sponsors must notify the Maryland Department of Agriculture (MDA), Animal Health Program Headquarters, 50 Harry S. Truman Parkway, Annapolis, MD 21401, of intent to sponsor an event that includes the exhibition of livestock or poultry no less than **30** days before the proposed event. Please fill out all contact information correctly, to include a phone number and email address. Animal arrival times MUST be provided to ensure coverage for entry. Please call 410-841-5810 to request an **EXHIBITION NOTIFICATION FORM** or go to MDA's website: https://mda.maryland.gov/animalhealth/pages/fairs-shows.aspx
- 2. **Reporting:** Sponsors must report to the Department any animal from the exhibition suspected of having or showing obvious, apparent, or known signs of a contagious or infectious disease and/or deaths; and exclude from the exhibition premises any animals having obvious, apparent, or known signs of a contagious or infectious disease. A summary of all disease events shall be provided to MDA, in the form of an **ANIMAL INCIDENT REPORT.** Call 410-841-5810 to request an **ANIMAL INCIDENT REPORT FORM** or go to MDA's website: http://mda.maryland.gov/AnimalHealth/Pages/Fairs- Shows.aspx
- 3. **Records:** Exhibit sponsors must maintain a report of the owner, premises location, and species of all animals attending the exhibition and provide this report upon request to MDA.
- 4. Exemptions: Exemptions of this regulation may be granted. (Refer to COMAR 15.11.14.05)

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITORS OF ALL ANIMAL SPECIES (COMAR 15.11.14.04-06)

Exhibitors at state, county, and district fairs, along with other livestock exhibitions, expositions, rodeos, shows, and swap meets are required to comply with regulatory provisions of the State of Maryland relating to animal health as noted in COMAR 15.11.14.04-06. Requirements apply to all livestock and poultry: Livestock is defined as those species of animals used for human food or fiber or those species of animals used for service to humans. This includes but is not limited to cattle, sheep, New World camelids (Ilamas & alpacas), goats, bison, privately owned cervids, swine, equine, and rabbits. Livestock does not include dogs, cats, and exotic pets. Poultry is defined as any living domestic bird raised for food or other purposes including, but not limited to, chicken, turkeys, ostriches, emus, rheas, cassowaries, other ratites, waterfowl, and game birds.

1. **DOCUMENTATION:** Documentation is required for entry of all livestock and poultry and is described below. Examples of forms can be obtained by

visiting the Animal Health website at: https://mda.maryland.gov/AnimalHealth/Pages/Fairs-Shows.aspx

For out-of-state animals, see species specific out of state requirements. Upon request, a person who exhibits livestock shall present for inspection all reports, test charts, and appropriate health certificates required to accompany the livestock and poultry.

- 2. CERTIFICATE OF VETERINARY INSPECTION is required for most entries.
 - a.MARYLAND ENTRIES: All Maryland entries must be accompanied by a Maryland Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) for show, except poultry, equine and rabbits.
 - The Maryland CVI is valid for 120 days for fairs and shows, providing that the status of the herd or animal(s) does not change.
 - The Maryland CVI is a **legible record**, made on an official Maryland State form, issued by a Maryland accredited veterinarian, issued for animals being shown within the state and not crossing a state line, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet the health requirements of the state of Maryland.
 - The Maryland CVI must be completed and signed by a Maryland accredited veterinarian using the properly selected report on the CVI form. Each animal must be properly identified on the CVI. The veterinarian must select if this document is for fair and exhibition season, sale or other (with explanation).
 - The veterinarian is required to send the original (white and canary) copies to MDA Headquarters within 7 days of completion, the middle (pink) transport copy is to be retained by the owner and should accompany livestock during travel. The last (goldenrod) copy is for the veterinarian's records.
 - OUT-OF-STATE ENTRIES: All out-of-state entries must be accompanied by an Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, except poultry and rabbits.
 - The Interstate CVI is valid for no more than 30 days from the date of inspection.
 - An Interstate CVI must be legible, made on an official form of the state of origin, issued by an accredited veterinarian, and issued for animals being imported to this state within 30 days before the entry of the animals, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet the health requirements of the state of Maryland.
- 3. SELF-CERTIFICATION: A completed *Self-Certification* is required for all entries except for equine entering equine-only events. *Self-Certification* forms **must be filled out within 24 hours prior to loading** and presented upon request to the designated representative
 - A Self-Certification is an official Maryland document signed by the owner/caretaker/ transporter stating that the animals presented for exhibition are not showing any signs of or having recent exposure to (within 21 days) infectious or contagious diseases.
 - Self-Certification forms are species-specific for livestock (ruminants, swine), equine, poultry and rabbits. These forms are available on MDA's Animal Health website: https://mda.maryland.gov/AnimalHealth/Pages/Fairs-Shows.aspx
- **TEST REPORT FORMS.** Testing is required for some species, and if so, a test report form will be required unless otherwise documented on the CVI. See species-specific requirements for details of testing and test report requirements. Examples of test reports are shown below:
 - Avian Influenza Testing Report
 - Pullorum-Typhoid Testing Report
 - Coggins Test Report (Equine Infectious Anemia)
 - Tuberculosis Test Report
- 5. MARYLAND POULTRY PREMISES IDENTIFICATION All Maryland premises with poultry are required to be registered with the Maryland Department of Agriculture. The Poultry Premises number must be noted on the Test Report or other documenta tion of NPIP U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid and U.S. H5/ H7 Avian Influenza Clean or State H5/H7 Monitored status.
- **6. ANIMAL REJECTION POLICY.** Animals may be rejected from an exhibition, either denied entry or removed from the exhibition, as described below:
 - a. FAILURE TO PROVIDE COMPLETED DOCUMENTATION IS GROUNDS FOR REJECTION.
 - b. <u>FOR A SKIN LESION SUSPICIOUS OF RINGWORM TO BE CONSIDERED NO LONGER CONTAGIOUS TO OTHER ANIMALS OR PEOPLE, NEW WOOL OR HAIR MUST COMPLETELY COVER THAT LESION.</u>
 - c. Livestock with clinical signs of infectious or contagious diseases or external parasites are not permitted entry or allowed to remain at the exhibition. Clinical signs include but are not limited to active lesions of ringworm with resulting loss of hair, sore mouth, sore nose, caseous lymphadenitis, prolapse, mange, or multiple warts easily visible without close examination.
 - **d.** Suspicion of communicable disease is adequate grounds for rejection. Confirmed diagnosis is not required, since timely removal of suspicious animals is required by law to protect the remaining animals.
 - e. Exposed animals may be rejected: If it is believed that there is a potentially serious communicable disease present, all animals originating with the suspect animal may be rejected. Vesicular diseases are of particular concern.
 - f. All decisions are final.
 - $\textbf{g.} \quad \text{All parties involved will be notified of all rejections, including exhibit sponsors and supervisors.}$
 - h. Animal rejections can be made by MDA Animal Health veterinarians or field inspectors, private veterinarians contracted by the show, Maryland Extension employees, or individuals designated by the fair or show as a 'responsible person.

SPECIES-SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

Fair and Show Requirements: Cattle

ALL CATTLE

IDENTIFICATION: INDIVIDUAL IDENTIFICATION OF EACH ANIMAL SHALL BE AN RFID OFFICIAL EAR TAG.

Rodeo Cattle must have official individual ID that is recognized by the USDA. Rodeo Cattle are NOT allowed to commingle with any other cattle at the exhibition.

Maryland Cattle

Brucellosis: Maryland is a Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland cattle.

Tuberculosis: Maryland is an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State. Tuberculin test is not required for Maryland cattle.

Immunization: Bovine Respiratory Disease Complex vaccination is required for all Maryland cattle to include Bovine Respiratory Syncytial Virus, Bovine Viral Diarrhea virus, Infectious Bovine Rhinotracheitis and Parainfluenza. Leptospirosis vaccination is recommended.

Out-of-State Cattle

Brucellosis:

- 1. Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State, Region or Zone
 - a. No brucellosis test required.
- 2. Non-Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State, Region or Zone
 - a. Official vaccinates under 24 months old with vaccination dates recorded on the Interstate CVI permitted, or
 - b. Test negative within 30 days before entry.

Tuberculosis:

- 1. Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State, Region or Zone
 - a. No tuberculin test required.
- 2. Modified Accredited Advanced or lower Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
 - a. All cattle over 6 months of age shall comply with the following:
 - i. Cattle must originate from a herd where a complete herd test was conducted within the past 12 months; progeny from such herds born since that test may be imported without a tuberculin test, or
 - ii. Any individual animal, over 6 months of age, entering Maryland must have a negative tuberculin test within 60 days before import.
 - b. Status of herd and area must be shown on certificate.

Fair and Show Requirements: Swine

ALL SWINE

IDENTIFICATION: INDIVIDUAL IDENTIFICATION OF EACH ANIMAL SHALL BE AN RFID OFFICIAL EAR TAG.

Maryland Swine

Brucellosis: Maryland is a Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland swine.

 $\underline{\textbf{Pseudorabies:}} \ \text{Maryland is a Pseudorabies Stage V state.} \ \text{Pseudorabies testing is not required for Maryland swine.}$

Immunization: Leptospirosis vaccination is recommended.

Out-of-State Swine

<u>Brucellosis</u>: All swine, except barrows, 6 months of age and older shall be negative on an official test for brucellosis within 30 days prior to exhibition entry, or originate directly from a validated brucellosis-free herd or brucellosis-free state.

<u>Pseudorabies</u>: Swine over 6 months of age shall be negative on an official test for pseudorabies conducted within 30 days prior to exhibition entry, or originate immediately and directly from a Qualified Pseudorabies Negative herd or Stage 4 or Stage 5 Pseudorabies-Free State.

Immunization: Leptospirosis vaccination is recommended.

Fair and Show Requirements: Sheep and Goats

ALL SHEEP

Identification for Sheep: All sheep must be officially scrapie-identified. Official identification for sheep includes the following:

- 1. USDA-approved scrapie ear tags;
- 2. Legible registration tattoos, for which the breed registration paper shall contain the registry premises or flock tattoo prefix that is linked to the APHIS-assigned PIN and flock ID number of the flock of birth, if breed registry is approved by APHIS; or
- 3. Legible tattoos consisting of an individual animal number unique within the flock in one ear and the official scrapie premises identification number (flock ID) in the other ear, except where the tail web or flank may be used for earless animals or animals with damaged ears; must be accompanied by an owner statement.
- 4. A microchip ID with official scrapie identification is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.
- RFID tags

Out-of-State Sheep

No additional requirements.

Market Lambs

It is recommended that all lambs be slick shorn prior to entry for inspection for club lamb fungus.

ALL GOATS

Identification for Goats: All goats must be officially scrapie-identified. Official identification for goats includes the following:

- 1. USDA-approved scrapie ear tags;
- 2. Legible registration tattoos, for which the breed registration paper shall contain the registry premises or flock tattoo prefix that is linked to the APHIS-assigned PIN and flock ID number of the flock of birth, if breed registry is approved by APHIS; or
- 3. Legible tattoos consisting of an individual animal number unique within the herd in one ear and the official scrapie premises identification number (flock ID) in the other ear, except where the tail web or flank may be used for earless animals or animals with damaged ears; must be accompanied by an owner statement.
- 4. A microchip ID with official scrapie identification is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.
- 5. RFID tags.

Brucellosis: Maryland is a Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland goats.

Tuberculosis: Maryland is an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State. Tuberculin test is not required for Maryland goats.

Out-of-State Goats

Tuberculosis:

- 1. Accredited Tuberculosis-Free States, Region or Zone: No tuberculin test required.
- 2. Modified Accredited Advanced or lower Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
 - a. All goats over 6 months of age shall comply with the following:
 - i. Goats must originate from herds in which all animals are tested negative within the past 12 months; progeny from such herds born since that test, may be imported without a tuberculin test, or
 - ii. Any individual animal entering Maryland must have a negative tuberculin test within 60 days before import.
 - b. Status of herd and area must be shown on certificate.

<u>Fair and Show Requirements: Horses, Ponies, Mules and Other Equidae</u> ALL EQUINE

Identification: Individual official identification shall include the following as applicable: EIA test report with photo or drawing of the animal, tattoo, brand, or microchip. *Animals using tattoos or brands for official identification must be accompanied by the breed registration papers.* Equine Infectious Anemia (Coggins) Testing: All equine for exhibition shall be accompanied by a valid Coggins Test done within 12 months prior to exhibition entry.

Self-Certification Requirement and Exemption: *Exhibitor's Self Certification of Animal Health* is required for each equine entering a fair/show-type event where multiple livestock species are present. The form must be available for inspection if requested. Those participating in equine-only shows and events are exempt from this requirement; however, it is good practice to thoroughly double check the health and skin condition of the animal before departing for the event. The form provides an easy checklist to do this. Exhibitors may not bring an animal having apparent or known signs of a contagious or infectious disease to a show.

Maryland Equine

- 1. All horses and other Equidae, 9 months of age and older, shall be accompanied by a negative test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) made within the 12 months before the date of the event. A copy of this test shall accompany every animal.
- 2. A Maryland CVI is not required for Maryland equine.

Out-of-State Equine

All horses and other Equidae, 9 months of age and older, shall be accompanied by a negative test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) made within the 12 months before the date of the event. A copy of this test shall accompany every animal.

All horses and other Equidae shall be accompanied by a CVI issued within 30 days prior to entry. An $\,$

Interstate CVI must be legible, made on an official form from the state of origin, issued by an accredited veterinarian, and issued for animals being imported to this state within 30 days before the entry of the animals, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet the health requirements of the state of Maryland.

Fair and Show Requirements: Poultry

ALL POULTRY

- 1. PRIVATE SALES WILL BE ALLOWED WITH PROPER DOCUMENTATION OF THE SALE BY THE EXHIBITION SPONSOR AND MAINTAINED FOR ONE YEAR.
- 2. IDENTIFICATION: Poultry entering an exhibition shall be identified with a numbered leg or wing band.
- 3. ALL POULTRY EXHIBITORS SHALL COMPLETE A POULTRY EXHIBITOR'S SELF- CERTIFICATION OF ANIMAL HEALTH.
- 4. DOCUMENTATION of test results must be provided on MDA-E06 and MDA-E20, VS Form 9-2, VS Form 9-3 or comparable form approved by the State Veterinarian.

Maryland Poultry

- 1. <u>Premises Registration</u>: All poultry exhibitors originating from Maryland must have valid proof of a registered Maryland Poultry Premises ID Number.
- 2. <u>Avian Influenza (AI) Testing Requirements</u>: All poultry, **including wild birds** except pigeons and doves, shown at public exhibitions in this state shall meet one of the following AI testing requirements:

- i. Originate directly from an NPIP U.S. H5/H7 Avian Influenza Clean Flock as defined in Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations, or from a State Avian Influenza Monitored Flock as defined by the state of origin, OR
- ii. Have a negative avian influenza test conducted on at least <u>15 birds</u> from their flock <u>(or complete flock if fewer than 15 birds)</u> within <u>30 days</u> prior to event and remain segregated from all birds of unknown or positive avian influenza test status.
- 3. <u>Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid Testing Requirements:</u> All poultry, except waterfowl, wild birds, pigeons and doves, shown at public exhibitions in this state shall meet one or more of the following requirements:
- i. Originate directly from an NPIP U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean flock as defined in Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations (and there was no break in the chain of ownership by NPIP participants),
- ii Have a negative official test for Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid within 90 days before fair, exhibition, exposition, or show and remain segregated from all poultry of unknown or positive Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid test status.

Out-of- State Poultry

- 1. <u>Avian Influenza (AI) Testing Requirements:</u> All poultry, **including wild birds** except pigeons and doves, shown at public exhibitions in this state shall meet one of the following AI testing requirements:
 - i. Originate directly from an NPIP U.S. H5/H7 Avian Influenza Clean Flock as defined in Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations, or from a State Avian Influenza Monitored Flock as defined by the state of origin, OR
 - ii. Have a negative avian influenza test conducted on at least 30 birds from their flock (or complete flock if fewer than 30 birds) within 21 days prior to the event and remain segregated from all birds of unknown or positive avian influenza test status.
- 2. <u>Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid Testing Requirements:</u> All poultry except waterfowl, wild birds, pigeons and doves shown at public exhibitions in this state shall meet one or more of the following requirements:
 - i. Originate directly from a U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean flock as defined in Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations (and there was no break in the chain of ownership by NPIP participants),
 - ii. Have a negative official test for Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid within 90 days before fair, exhibition, exposition, or show and remain segregated from all poultry of unknown or positive Salmonella Pullorum-Typhoid test status.

Fair and Show Requirements: Rabbits

ALL RABBITS

- 1. See Rabbit Waiver: Rabbits are not required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
- 2. Identification: Individual identification of each animal shall be a tag, tattoo, or microchip, if the exhibitor provides the reader.
- 3. All rabbit exhibitors shall complete a Rabbit Exhibitor's Self Certification of Animal Health.

Maryland and Out-of-State Rabbits

No additional requirements.

Fair and Show Requirements: Camelids

ALL CAMELIDS

Identification: Individual identification of each animal shall be an official metal ear tag or microchip, if the exhibitor provides the reader.

Maryland Camelids

Brucellosis: Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland camelids. Tuberculosis: Tuberculin test is not required for Maryland camelids

Out-Of-State Camelids

Brucellosis: Brucellosis testing is not required for out-of-state camelids.

Tuberculosis:

- 1. Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State, Region or Zone
 - a. No tuberculin test required.
- 2. Modified Accredited Advanced or lower Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
 - a. All camelids over 6 months of age shall comply with the following:
 - i. Camelids must originate from a herd not under restriction or quarantine for tuberculosis and from which a complete herd test was conducted within the past 12 months; progeny from such herds born since that test may be imported without a tuberculin test, or
 - ii. Any individual animal, over 6 months of age, entering Maryland must have a negative tuberculin test within 60 days before import.
- b. Status of herd and area must be shown on certificate.

- 1. Poultry competition will be open to all Maryland Counties.
- 2. Entry fee per bird: 50 cents. Entry fee will be deducted from your premiums.
- 3. Use notebook paper to list entries, your name, address, phone number, & Poultry Premise I.D.Number.
- 4. Entries must be entered via online entry system.
- 5. Cooping in day is Tuesday (Fair week) from 5:00 p.m. 8:00 p.m. Any early cooping must have valid reason and approval from the Poultry Chairperson.
- 6. No exhibit may be removed from the Poultry Department before Sunday the last day of the fair from 6:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.
- 7. All birds must be Avian Flu and Pullorum tested and banded, and an original copy of test papers to be held until after the show. For information on testers, contact MDA Animal Health Division at (410) 841-5810.
- 8. Notice: All species of fowl entered will be subject to daily inspection by a representative of the Maryland Livestock Sanitary Service (MLSS). Any bird showing symptoms of disease will be disqualified and be removed immediately from the building for the duration of the Fair and isolated as directed by the MLSS Representative. Such birds may not return to the building for the duration of the Fair.
- 9. Entry fees paid on any disqualified bird will not be returned.
- 10. Be sure to state whether entry is for large fowl, bantams, ducks, geese, pigeons, turkey or pheasant. If not they will be entered as large fowl and judged that way.
- 11. Give name and variety as shown in the American Poultry Association "Standard of Perfection".
- 12. Management is not responsible for loss by fire or otherwise but will exercise all vigilance in the case of exhibits and the police arrangements of the grounds.
- 13. The same bird entries are encouraged to compete in both the open and 4 H classes.
- 14. All birds shown must be the property of the exhibitor for at least 3 months prior to the Fair.
- 15. The greatest care will be taken of all specimens but the Fair will not be responsible for any accidents, mistakes, loss or damage from whatever arises. The specimen being exhibited is at the sole risk of the exhibitor.
- 16. Specimens will be fed, watered and cared for by the poultry department staff.
- 17. Judging will be by comparison & governed by the American Poultry Association "Standard of Perfection" and all specimens shall be exhibited in their natural conditions, with the exception of game and game bantams. Any violation of these rules shall exclude the specimen from competing and cause the withholding of the premium awarded to the owner of such birds.
- 18. No advertising cards or inscriptions will be allowed on coops until after judging has been completed.
- 19. No pairs or trios will be shown.
- 20. Exhibitors are not allowed to show their own competition and are limited to 1 entry per class.

Any violation of the rules and regulations will result in the forfeiture of premiums awarded to the exhibitor Only upon these conditions will your entry be accepted.

- 7. Rabbit competition will be open to the 5 Southern Maryland Counties.
- 8. Rabbits can only be received between the hours of 3:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m on Tuesday of fairweek. Once the rabbits are entered they are not allowed to be taken out of the Rabbit Barn until designated release time.
- 9. Rabbits will be fed and watered by the Rabbit Department Staff. The Fair will supply feed and litter, but you must provide feeders and waterers for your rabbits.
- 10. The Fair will take the greatest care of all exhibits, but the Fair will not be liable for any accidents, loss or damages. **THE EXHIBITORS ENTER AT THEIR OWN RISK.**

- 11. An exhibitor will be limited to 2 entries in each class regardless of breed.
- 12. All cages must be swept by the owner at the end of the show or premiums will be withheld.
- 13. The Market Pen consists of 3 rabbits that are all the same breed & variety, mixed breeds are not allowed. Age restriction: not over 69 days old as of fair check in day. All breeds will compete together.
