GENERAL RULES FOR ALL LIVESTOCK

- Exhibitors must comply with the State of Maryland Health Regulations for livestock & submit a copy of the Maryland Veterinary Health Certificate with all entries
- 2 Priority for entries accepted will be given first to Anne Arundel County residents, the five Southern Maryland counties, and previous exhibitors on a space available basis.
- Entries must be entered via the online entry system by August 28 at 11:59 p.m. NO late entries will be accepted. Entry fees will be processed online.
- Stalls and pens will be allotted on a space available basis. Check in time is Tuesday of Fair Week from 3:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. Check out is Sunday of Fair Week at 6:30 p.m. Nothing should be removed from the pens/stall/barn prior to this time. Early dismissal is NOT permitted. All livestock exhibitors must have their pens/stalls checked for cleanliness before leaving the fairgrounds upon checkout or they risk forfeiting premiums.
- Substitutions will be allowed if ownership is identical to the original entry.
- Where there is one (1) animal in a class, award will depend upon merit of the animal and is left to the discretion of the judge.
- 7 Exhibitors will be expected to comply with the arrival, release and show times specified for their respective departments.
- All animals must be owned by the exhibitor at least 60 days prior to check in date or be a Fair approved leasing program. All groups of animals must be owned by the exhibitor if shown as such.
- 9. No exhibitor can win more than two premiums in one class. No more than two entries or exhibits per class.
- 10. Registration and health certificates must be furnished and available anytime during the Fair. Certificates will be checked prior to check in.
- 11. All animals must be registered in the name of exhibitor. In order to be eligible for the group classes, animals must be entered and shown in their respective individual classes. Animals cannot be cross entered or in market/breeding classes.
- 12. Sanitary conditions must be maintained in the barns, wash rack and tie out areas at all times.
- 13. Cattle tie-out times are from the time the fair closes until one hour before the fair opens the next day. Animals are to be ready for viewing one hour
- 14. NO walking of animals is allowed during the time the fair is open with the exception of to and from the wash rack
- Initial bedding will be provided or bring your own Fair approved bedding. Additional bedding will be for sale at Fairgrounds. All exhibitors are responsible for the cleaning of pens/stalls. Premiums will be withheld for noncompliance.
- 16. The Anne Arundel County Fair reserves the right to send any animal home that they believe should not be shown or exhibited.
- 17. Participants must comply with the Rules & Regulations listed for each department.
- 18. Noncompliance with any rules or directives may result in forfeiture of premiums & expulsion.
- 19. The Anne Arundel County Fair extends the privilege to 4-H/FFA exhibitors to compete in the open division of livestock classes.
- 20. The right to modify and/or cancel any section or class is reserved by the Anne Arundel County Fair Week Committee.
- 21. 4-H/FFA Member and Volunteer cards and/or wrist bands provided through the AACo Extension Office/FFA Faculty are considered passes to the Anne Arundel County Fair.
- 22. Exhibitors are limited to 6 head of cattle per breed and 10 sheep or goats per breed.
- 23. The Anne Arundel County Fair reserves the right to cancel any event or contest without notice at any time without liability.
- 24. Management assumes no responsibility for loss or damage from any causes.
- NO pets, NO exotic animals, NO drugs and, NO fire arms are allowed on fairgrounds during fair week.
- 26. Slick Shearing of sheep and goats is PROHIBITED unless PRE-APPROVED as a demonstration.
- 27. Goats must be shown with smooth chain collars only. No training collars allowed.
- 28. Only approved volunteers are allowed in the show ring.
- 29. Animal health inspections will occur at check-in and throughout the time the animals are at the fair. If an animal is found to have a contagious disease and needs to be sent home a committee of 3 will make the decision out of this list of fair personnel: Fair President, Fair Week Manager, Barn Manager, Species chairperson, 4-H and/or FFA Advisor. A veterinarian or government animal health inspector can make the decision alone, if present.

CHAIRPERSONS

1. Chairperson will have care and complete supervision of their departments and ensure all rules and regulations are followed.

JUDGES

- 1. All decisions of the judges will be final.
- No exhibitor shall attempt to interfere with the judges in any manner, subject to forfeiture of any or all awards.
- Judges will not award any animal a premium unless in their opinion it is so merited.
- Animals will be judged at a time and place designated by the Fair Association.
- 5. When there is but one exhibitor in a class the judges will award only the premium merited in the opinion of the judges.

GRIEVANCE PROCESS

- 1. All protests must be made in writing, must state plainly the complaint, must be delivered to the Fair Week Manager or Barn Manager within 48 hours following the judging of the class in dispute, and must be accompanied by a fee of \$50, which shall be forfeited to the Anne Arundel County Fair in the case the protest is not sustained.
- 2. All grievances involving the Anne Arundel County Fair must be made in writing, must state plainly the grievance, must be delivered to the Barn Manager within 48 hours of said disputed activity, and be accompanied by a fee of \$50 which shall be forfeited to the Anne Arundel County Fair in the case the grievance is not sustained.
- 3. The grievance/protest committee is comprised of the Fair President, Fair Vice President, Fair Week Manager, Barn Manager and the appropriate 4-H or FFA Leader, as needed. The committee may also include 4-H Club leaders and Species Chairpersons. There will be a minimum of 5 people on this committee
- 4. If a grievance is submitted outside of fair week, the issue will be reviewed at the next Anne Arundel County Fair Board of Directors meeting.

4-H EXHIBITORS: SPECIFIC RULES

- All 4-H members exhibiting livestock must adhere to the following:
 - (A) General Rules for All Livestock
 - (B) National Code of Show Ring Ethics
 - (C) Species Rules listed under each livestock department
 - (D) 4-H Exhibitors: Specific Rules
- 4-H members may receive assistance with daily care, management and transportation of their project animal(s) from immediate family and AACO County 4-H members in good standing with the same project discipline. On show day, the 4-H member is responsible for preparing and presenting his/her project animal(s).
- 3. Prior to the listed dates below, ALL 4-H Livestock projects must be registered in the exhibitor's name using the "Maryland 4-H Livestock Registration Form" in accordance with Maryland 4-H Animal Science Rules & Guidelines:
 - (A) Beef cattle by the second Saturday in January
 - (B) All sheep, all goats and all pigs by the 3rd Wednesday in May
 - (C) All poultry and all rabbits by June 1
- 4. All 4-H market livestock MUST have a Maryland 4-H ear tag. All ear tags must correspond to livestock registration information received.
- All "Breed Association Certificates" (documents that verify an animals purebred status) are due to the 4-H
 Office prior to Anne Arundel County Fair Livestock Entry Day.
- 6. Proper Fitting and Showing attire must be worn in all classes and during the livestock sale.
 - (A) 4-H Boys: Tan, green, or white slacks; white or tan shirt with green, brown, or black tie. Closed-toe shoes. NO Crocs. Exception: Attire for Dairy Cattle and Dairy Goats is all white.
 - (B) 4-H Girls: Tan, green, or white skirt, slacks, or culottes; white or tan shirt with green, brown, or black neckpiece. Closed-toe shoes. NO Crocs. Exception: Attire for Dairy Cattle and Dairy Goats is all white.
- 7. All 4-H market animals MUST have been weighed and tagged at the official weigh-in at the beginning of the project. The 4-H Office will verify this.
- 8. Dairy animals in the Maryland 4-H Dairy Cattle Leasing Program must be assigned to the exhibitor by June 1 of the current year.
- 9. All 4-H members showing livestock must comply with both of the following:
 - (A) Submitted a project record book for the previous year, unless this is the first year in 4- H
 - (B) Have been enrolled in 4-H online since the start of the year's project
 - (C) Complete the Maryland/ West Virginia Animal Husbandry Quality Assurance Program
- 10. Only 4-H and FFA animals can be sold at the Livestock Auction and they must comply with the Anne Arundel County Livestock Auction Rules. All grand champion market animals must be sold at the livestock sale.
- 11. Exhibitors are expected to keep their animals under control at all times. No uncontrollable animals will be allowed in the show ring. Any uncontrollable animals may be asked by the barn chairperson or species chairperson to leave the ring or the fairgrounds at any time during the fair. All reasonable precautions will be taken for the safety of the people while on the property, but the AACO Fair Board shall not be responsible for injury to any person

GENERAL RULES FOR FFA EXHIBITORS

- 1. All FFA members exhibiting livestock must adhere to the following:
 - (A) General Rules for All Livestock
 - (B) National Code of Show Ring Ethics
 - (C) Species Rules listed under each livestock department
 - (D) FFA Exhibitors: Specific Rules
- 2. See the Anne Arundel County 4-H/FFA Fair catalog for all 4-H/FFA livestock class information (found on the Anne Arundel County 4-H website), and the Anne Arundel County Fair Catalog for all Open livestock class information (found on the Anne Arundel County Fair website).
- 3. FFA members may receive assistance with daily care, management and transportation of their project animal(s) from immediate family and AACO County FFA members in good standing with the same project

- discipline. On show day, the 4-H member is responsible for preparing and presenting his/her project animal(s).
- 4. All FFA members must complete the Maryland/ West Virginia Animal Husbandry Quality Assurance Program.
- 5. All animals to be shown must be registered with your FFA advisor in the exhibitor's name by the following dates:
 - (A) Beef by the second Saturday in January
 - (B) All livestock, except beef, by the third Wednesday in May of current year.
- 6. All FFA market livestock MUST have a Maryland FFA ear tag. All ear tags must correspond to livestock registration information received.
- 7. The FFA advisor must have a copy of Animal Ownership and Registration for breeding animals by July 1 of the current year.
- 8. The uniform worn by FFA members at local, state and national functions is called official dress. It provides identity and gives a distinctive and recognizable image to the organization. FFA members exhibiting livestock at the AACO Fair will wear an FFA jacket, a white collared shirt, black or tan slacks, an official FFA tie or scarf, and closed heel and toe boots. (For safety reasons, dress shoes and tennis shoes are not permitted).
- 9. All FFA market animals must have been weighed and tagged at the official weigh-in at the beginning of the project. The FFA Advisor will verify this.
- 10. FFA members must have annual dues paid in their local Maryland FFA Chapter for the current year a member cannot have passed their 19th birthday as of January 1 of the current year when competing in the same class with 4-H members.

LIVESTOCK RATE OF GAIN REQUIREMENTS

Beef steers, market lambs, and market pigs will have minimum rate-of-gains required to show. This means that market animals will have to gain a certain amount per day from Tag-In Day to the County Fair. All livestock exhibitors are expected to turn in a ROG Form.

SHEEP - 0.3 lbs. per day SWINE - 1.5 lbs. per day STEER - 2.0 lbs. per day

NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS IAFE (INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS)

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of
 ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is
 prohibited.
- Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event, which culminates with the animal entering the food chain, shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statues, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested (by the approved laboratory to which it is sent) is the one taken from the animal in question. Its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair or livestock show.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

- Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by duly licensed veterinarian for the solepurpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.

- Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair, or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed
 representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of
 their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with
 courtesy, cooperation, and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to
 intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons eitherby
 affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to
 disciplinary action.
- The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible
 person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show against such individuals published in any
 publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special
 notices to members.
- The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

2025 MARYLAND ANIMAL HEALTH FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS

The Maryland Department of Agriculture's (MDA) Animal Health Program strives to safeguard Maryland's animal industries at our fairs and shows. With an increased potential of disease transmission occurring when large numbers of animals gather for exhibition, MDA has set forth requirements for exhibitors to follow at Maryland fairs and shows. As an exhibitor, you can help reduce the potential risk of introduction and spread of infectious and/or contagious diseases by following the species-specific health requirements below.

ANIMAL HEALTH ALERT HIGHLY PATHOGENIC AVIAN INFLUENZA

FEBRUARY 2025: DUE TO THE RECENT OUTBREAK OF HIGHLY PATHOGENIC AVIAN INFLUENZA (HPAI) IN BOTH COMMERCIAL AND BACKYARD FLOCKS IN MARYLAND, THE 2025 ANIMAL HEALTH FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS ARE AS FOLLOWS:

NO POULTRY EXHIBITIONS WILL BE ALLOWED PRIOR TO JUNE 1, 2025.

A DECISION WILL BE MADE ON JUNE 1, 2025 REGARDING POULTRY EXHIBITIONS FOR THE REMAINDER OF THE SHOW SEASON.

NOTABLE 2025 ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS TO MENTION:

- 1. CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION (CVI):
 - a. Online CVIs have always been accepted but are encouraged and strongly recommended. Please urge the owner to print out a copy to keep with the animal(s).
- 2. CATTLE
 - a. Bovine Respiratory Disease Complex vaccination is RECOMMENDED for Maryland cattle, but is no longer a requirement.
- 3. RODEO LIVESTOCK
 - a. All rodeo livestock should follow the same requirements as those attending a fair or show.
- 4. POULTRY/AVIAN INFLUENZA TESTING:
 - a. For avian influenza testing, ALL BIRDS IN THE FLOCK must test negative unless there are greater than 15 birds in the flock, then only 15 birds need to be tested. (For out-of-state flocks, if there are greater than 30 birds IN THE FLOCK then only 30 birds need to test negative.) "Flock" is defined as "all of the poultry on one premises, except any group of poultry that has been segregated for 21 days may be considered a separate flock" (COMAR 15.11.11.02)

Maryland Law provides penalties for violations of Animal Health Law and Regulations. LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY FAILING TO MEET COMPLETE DOCUMENTATION OF ALL REQUIREMENTS WILL BE DENIED ENTRY OR REMOVED FROM THE EXHIBITION - "REJECTED." SEE ANIMAL REJECTION POLICY UNDER GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITORS.

REQUIREMENTS FOR SPONSORS OF A LIVESTOCK/POULTRY EXHIBITION

(COMAR 15.11.14.05)

- 1. Notification: Exhibit sponsors must notify the Maryland Department of Agriculture (MDA), Animal Health Program Headquarters, 50 Harry S. Truman Parkway, Annapolis, MD 21401, of intent to sponsor an event that includes the exhibition of livestock or poultry no less than 30 days before the proposed event. Please fill out all contact information correctly, to include a phone number and email address. Animal arrival times MUST be provided to ensure coverage for entry. Please call 410.841.5810 to request an EXHIBITION NOTIFICATION form or go to MDA's website: https://mda.maryland.gov/AnimalHealth/Pages/Fairs-Shows.aspx
- 2. Reporting: Sponsors must report to MDA, within 24 hours, any animal from the exhibition suspected of having or showing obvious, apparent, or known signs of a contagious or infectious disease and/or deaths; and exclude from the exhibition premises any animals having obvious, apparent, or known signs of a contagious or infectious disease. A summary of all disease events shall be provided to MDA, in the form of an ANIMAL INCIDENT REPORT. Call 410.841.5810 to request an ANIMAL INCIDENT REPORT FORM or go to MDA's website: https://mda.maryland.gov/AnimalHealth/Pages/Fairs-Shows.aspx
- 3. **Records**: Exhibit sponsors must maintain a report of the owner, premises location, and species of all animals attending the exhibition and provide this report upon request to MDA.
- 4. **Exemptions**: Exemptions of this regulation may be granted. (Refer to COMAR 15.11.14.05)

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITORS OF ALL ANIMAL SPECIES

(COMAR 15.11.14.04-06)

- **Exhibitors** at state, county, and district fairs, along with other livestock exhibitions, expositions, rodeos, shows, and swap meets are required to comply with regulatory provisions of the State of Maryland relating to animal health as noted in COMAR 15.11.14.04-06.
- Requirements apply to all livestock and poultry: <u>Livestock</u> is defined as those species of animals used for human food or fiber or those species of animals used for service to humans. This includes but is not limited to cattle, bison, sheep, goats, swine, equine, New World camelids (Ilamas & alpacas), privately owned cervids, and rabbits. Livestock does not include dogs, cats, and exotic pets. <u>Poultry</u> is defined as any living domestic bird raised for food or other purposes including, but not limited to, chickens, turkeys, ostriches, emus, rheas, cassowaries, other ratites, waterfowl, and game birds.
- DOCUMENTATION: Documentation is required for entry of all livestock and poultry and is described below. Examples of forms can be obtained by visiting the Animal Health website at: https://mda.maryland.gov/AnimalHealth/Pages/Fairs-Shows.aspx
 - a. For out-of-state animals, see species specific out of state requirements. Upon request, a person who exhibits livestock or poultry shall present for inspection all reports, test results, and appropriate health certificates required to accompany their animal(s).
- 2. CERTIFICATE OF VETERINARY INSPECTION (CVI): Required for most entries.
 - MARYLAND ENTRIES: All Maryland entries must be accompanied by a Maryland Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) for show, except poultry, equine and rabbits.
 - i. The Maryland CVI is **valid for 120 days for Maryland fairs and shows**, providing that the status of the herd or animal(s) does not change.
 - ii. The Maryland CVI is a **legible record**, made on an official Maryland State form, issued by a Maryland and USDA Category II accredited veterinarian, issued for animals being shown within the state and not crossing a state line, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet the health requirements of the state of Maryland.
 - iii. The Maryland CVI must be completed and signed by an accredited veterinarian (as described above) using the properly selected report on the CVI form. Each animal must be properly identified on the CVI. The veterinarian must select if this document is for fair and exhibition season, sale or other (with explanation).
 - IV. The veterinarian is required to send the original (white and canary) copies to MDA Headquarters within 7 days of completion, the middle (pink) transport copy is to be retained by the owner and should accompany livestock during travel. The last (goldenrod) copy is for the veterinarian's records. Alternatively, the CVI can be completed through an online system, but it is STRONGLY recommended for the owner to print out a copy to keep with the animal.
 - b. **OUT-OF-STATE ENTRIES**: All out-of-state entries must be accompanied by an **Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection**, except poultry and rabbits.
 - i. The Interstate CVI is valid for no more than 30 days from the date of inspection.
 - ii. An Interstate CVI must be **legible**, made on an official form of the state of origin, issued by an accredited veterinarian (both USDA and in the state or origin), and issued for animals being imported to this state within 30 days before the entry of the animals, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet the health requirements of the state of Maryland. If this CVI is performed online, the owner is encouraged to print a copy to display at the time of entry and keep with the animal(s).

- SELF-CERTIFICATION: A completed Self-Certification form is required for all entries except for equine entering equine-only events.
 - Self-Certification forms must be filled out within 24 hours prior to loading and presented upon request to the designated representative.
 - A Self-Certification is an official Maryland document signed by the owner/caretaker/ transporter stating that the animals presented for exhibition are not showing any signs of or having recent exposure to infectious or contagious diseases (within 21 days).
 - ii. Self-Certification forms are species-specific for livestock (ruminants/swine), equine, poultry and rabbits.
 - These forms are available on MDA's Animal Health website: https://mda.maryland.gov/ AnimalHealth/Pages/Fairs-Shows.aspx
- 4. **TEST REPORT FORMS**: Testing is required for some species, and if so, a test report form will be required unless otherwise documented on the CVI. See species-specific requirements for details of testing and test report requirements. Examples of test reports are shown below:
 - a. Avian Influenza Test Report
 - b. Pullorum-Typhoid Test Report
 - c. Coggins Test Report (Equine Infectious Anemia)
 - d. Tuberculosis Test Report
 - e. HPAI Milk Test Report for LACTATING DAIRY cattle
- MARYLAND POULTRY PREMISES IDENTIFICATION: All Maryland premises with poultry are <u>required</u> to be registered with MDA. The Poultry Premises number <u>must</u> be noted on the Test Report or other documentation of NPIP U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid and
 - U.S. H5/ H7 Avian Influenza Clean or State H5/H7 Monitored status. To obtain a poultry premises number, please fill out the application available on our website: https://mda.maryland.gov/AnimalHealth/Documents/poultry-registration-form.pdf
- 6. **ANIMAL REJECTION POLICY:** Animals may be rejected from an exhibition, either denied entry or removed from the exhibition, as described below:
 - a. FAILURE TO PROVIDE COMPLETED DOCUMENTATION IS GROUNDS FOR REJECTION.
 - Suspicion of communicable disease is adequate grounds for rejection. Confirmed diagnosis is not required since timely removal of suspicious animals is required by law to protect the remaining animals.
 - c. Livestock with clinical signs of infectious or contagious diseases or external parasites are not permitted entry or allowed to remain at the exhibition. Clinical signs include but are not limited to active lesions of ringworm with resulting loss of hair, sore mouth, sore nose, caseous lymphadenitis, mange, or multiple warts easily visible without close examination.
 - d. Exposed animals may be rejected if it is believed that there is a potentially serious communicable disease present. All animals originating with the suspect animal may be rejected. Vesicular diseases are of particular concern.
 - e. All decisions are final.
 - f. All parties involved will be notified of all rejections, including exhibit sponsors and supervisors.
 - g. Animal rejections can be made by MDA Animal Health veterinarians or field inspectors, private veterinarians contracted by the show, Maryland Extension employees, or individuals designated by the fair or show as a 'responsible person.'

SPECIES-SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

In addition to the general requirements above, specific requirements by species are shown for the following species:

Cattle

Goats

Petting Zoos

FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS: CATTLE

ALL CATTLE

IDENTIFICATION: INDIVIDUAL IDENTIFICATION OF EACH ANIMAL SHALL BE AN RFID OFFICIAL EAR TAG.

Rodeo Cattle must have official individual ID that is recognized by the USDA (9 CFR Parts 71, 77, 78, and 86). Rodeo Cattle are NOT allowed to commingle with any other cattle at the exhibition.

Maryland Cattle

- Influenza A: No testing requirements for Maryland cattle.
- Brucellosis: Maryland is a Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland cattle.
- Tuberculosis: Maryland is an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State. A tuberculin test is not required for Maryland cattle.
- Immunization: Bovine Respiratory Disease Complex vaccination is <u>recommended</u> for all cattle to include Bovine Respiratory Syncytial Virus, Bovine Viral Diarrhea Virus, Infectious Bovine Rhinotracheitis and Parainfluenza. Leptospirosis vaccination is also recommended.

Out-of-State Cattle

Influenza A:

- a. For <u>LACTATING DAIRY</u> cattle (defined as a cow that is producing milk, regardless of the volume of milk that she is producing. This does not include dairy calves, pregnant heifers, or dairy cows that are 'dry' or no longer producing milk.)
 - I. A milk sample <u>from all four quarters</u> must be tested for Influenza A within 7 days of travel, and results must be written on the CVI. Failure to comply will result in denied entry. A bulk tank sample will not be accepted.

Brucellosis:

- a. Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State, Region or Zone
 - No brucellosis test required.
- O. Non-Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State, Region or Zone
 - Official vaccinates under 24 months old with vaccination dates recorded on the Interstate CVI permitted, or
 - ii. Test negative within 30 days before entry.

• Tuberculosis:

- a. Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State, Region or Zone
 - No tuberculin test required.
- b. Modified Accredited Advanced or lower Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
 - i. All cattle over 6 months of age shall comply with the following:
 - Cattle must originate from a herd where a complete herd test was conducted within the
 past 12 months; progeny from such herds born since that test may be imported without a
 tuberculin test, or
 - 2. Any individual animal, over 6 months of age, entering Maryland must have a negative tuberculin test within 60 days before import.
 - ii. Status of herd and area must be shown on their certificate.
- Immunization: Bovine Respiratory Disease Complex vaccination is <u>recommended</u> for all out of state cattle to include Bovine Respiratory Syncytial Virus, Bovine Viral Diarrhea Virus, Infectious Bovine Rhinotracheitis and Parainfluenza. Leptospirosis vaccination is also recommended.

FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS: SWINE

ALL SWINE

IDENTIFICATION: INDIVIDUAL IDENTIFICATION OF EACH ANIMAL SHALL BE AN RFID OFFICIAL EAR TAG.

Maryland Swine

- Brucellosis: Maryland is a Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland swine.
- Pseudorabies: Maryland is a Pseudorabies Stage V state. Pseudorabies testing is not required for Maryland swine.
- Immunization: Leptospirosis vaccination is recommended.

Out-of-State Swine

- Brucellosis: All swine, except barrows, 6 months of age and older shall be negative on an official test for brucellosis within 30 days prior to exhibition entry, or originate directly from a validated brucellosis-free herd or brucellosis-free state.
- Pseudorabies: Swine over 6 months of age shall be negative on an official test for pseudorabies conducted within 30 days prior to exhibition entry, or originate immediately and directly from a Qualified Pseudorabies Negative herd or Stage 4 or Stage 5 Pseudorabies-Free State.
- Immunization: Leptospirosis vaccination is recommended.
- All U.S. states are currently swine brucellosis free and pseudorables free (this is the current status as of February 2025 but please continue to regularly check each state's status for any changes).

FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS: SHEEP AND GOATS

ALL SHEEP

Identification for Sheep: All sheep must be officially Scrapie-identified. Official identification for sheep includes the following:

- 1. USDA-approved Scrapie ear tags;
- Legible registration tattoos, for which the breed registration paper shall contain the registry premises or flock tattoo prefix that is linked to the APHIS-assigned PIN and flock ID number of the flock of birth, if breed registry is approved by APHIS; or
- 3. Legible tattoos consisting of an individual animal number unique within the flock in one ear and the official Scrapie premises identification number (flock ID) in the other ear, except where the tail web or flank may be used for earless animals or animals with damaged ears; must be accompanied by an owner statement.
- 4. A microchip ID with official Scrapie identification is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.
- 5. USDA approved RFID tag.

Out-of-State Sheep

Market Lambs

It is recommended that all lambs be slick shorn prior to entry for inspection for Club Lamb Fungus (sheep ringworm).

ALL GOATS

Identification for Goats: All goats must be officially Scrapie-identified. Official identification for goats includes the following:

- 1. USDA-approved Scrapie ear tags;
- Legible registration tattoos, for which the breed registration paper shall contain the registry premises or flock tattoo prefix that is linked to the APHIS-assigned PIN and flock ID number of the flock of birth, if breed registry is approved by APHIS; or
- 3. Legible tattoos consisting of an individual animal number unique within the herd in one ear and the official Scrapie premises identification number (flock ID) in the other ear, except where the tail web or flank may be used for earless animals or animals with damaged ears; must be accompanied by an owner statement.
- 4. A microchip ID with official Scrapie identification is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.
- 5. USDA approved RFID tag.

Maryland Goats

Brucellosis: Maryland is a Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland goats. **Tuberculosis**: Maryland is an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State. Tuberculin test is not required for Maryland goats.

Out-of-State Goats

Tuberculosis:

- Accredited Tuberculosis-Free States, Region or Zone: A tuberculin test is not required.
- 2. Modified Accredited Advanced or lower Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
 - a. All goats over 6 months of age shall comply with the following:
 - i. Goats must originate from herds in which all animals are tested negative within the past 12 months; progeny from such herds born since that test, may be imported without a tuberculin test, or
 - ii. Any individual animal entering Maryland must have a negative tuberculin test within 60 days before import.
 - b. Status of herd and area must be shown on their certificate.

Brucellosis:

1. There are no out of state requirements for brucellosis testing in goats.

FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS: HORSES, PONIES, MULES, AND OTHER EQUIDAE

ALL EQUINE

- Identification: Individual official identification shall include the following as applicable: Equine Infectious Anemia
 (EIA) test report with photo or drawing of the animal, tattoo, brand, or microchip. Animals using tattoos or brands
 for official identification must be accompanied by the breed registration papers.
- Equine Infectious Anemia (Coggins) Testing: All equine for exhibition shall be accompanied by a valid Coggins Test done within 12 months prior to exhibition entry.
- Self-Certification Requirement and Exemption: Exhibitor's Self Certification of Animal Health is required for each
 equine entering a fair/show-type event where multiple livestock species are present. The form must be available
 for inspection if requested. Those participating in equine-only shows and events are exempt from this requirement;
 however, it is good practice to thoroughly double check the health and skin condition of the animal before departing
 for the event. The form provides an easy checklist to do this. Exhibitors may not bring an animal having apparent or
 known signs of a contagious or infectious disease to a show.

Maryland Equine

- 1. All horses and other equidae, 9 months of age and older, shall be accompanied by a negative test for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) within the 12 months before the date of the event. A copy of this test shall accompany every animal.
- 2. A Maryland CVI is not required for Maryland equine.

Out-of-State Equine

- All horses and other equidae, 9 months of age and older, shall be accompanied by a negative test for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) within the 12 months before the date of the event. A copy of this test shall accompany every animal.
- 2. All horses and other equidae shall be accompanied by a CVI issued within 30 days prior to entry. An Interstate CVI must be legible, made on an official form from the state of origin, issued by an accredited veterinarian, and issued for animals being imported to this state within 30 days before the entry of the animals, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet the health requirements of the state of Maryland.
 - a. The following contiguous states and New Jersey are exempted from the CVI requirement: Delaware, Pennsylvania, Virginia, and West Virginia.

FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS: RABBITS

ALL RABBITS

- 1. Rabbits are not required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
- 2. **Identification**: Individual identification of each animal shall be a tag, tattoo, or microchip, if the exhibitor provides the reader.
- 3. All rabbit exhibitors shall complete a Rabbit Exhibitor's Self Certification of Animal Health.

No additional requirements for out of state rabbits.

FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS: CAMELIDS

ALL CAMELIDS

Identification: Individual identification of each animal shall be an official metal ear tag or microchip, if the exhibitor provides the reader.

Maryland Camelids

Brucellosis: Brucellosis testing is not required for Maryland camelids.

Tuberculosis: Tuberculin test is not required for Maryland camelids.

Out-Of-State Camelids

- Brucellosis: Brucellosis testing is not required for out-of-state camelids.
- Tuberculosis:
 - 1. Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State, Region or Zone
 - a. No tuberculin test required.
 - 2. Modified Accredited Advanced or lower Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
 - a. All camelids over 6 months of age shall comply with the following:
 - Camelids must originate from a herd not under restriction or quarantine for tuberculosis and from which a complete herd test was conducted within the past 12 months; progeny from such herds born since that test may be imported without a tuberculin test, or
 - Any individual animal, over 6 months of age, entering Maryland must have a negative tuberculin test within 60 days before import.
 - b. Status of herd and area must be shown on their certificate.

FAIR AND SHOW REQUIREMENTS: PETTING ZOOS

Definition of a Petting Zoo

- An exhibition where the public is encouraged to touch any livestock or other animals.
- This can include but is not limited to pony rides, fair and show petting zoos, educational displays with livestock, etc.
- Breed displays, birthing centers and other displays/exhibits where the public is not permitted to touch the animals may be excluded.

Petting zoos and pony rides must have a CVI, indicating rabies vaccination status, and self-certification documents.

The requirements for each species is the same for fairs and shows (see previous sections)

General Exhibition Requirements (COMAR 15.11.14.01):

Applies to ALL animals in a petting zoo.

- Rabies Vaccination:
 - A person may not show livestock at any petting zoo unless all exhibited animals in the petting zoo, 12 weeks or older, are vaccinated against rabies as provided in COMAR 10.06.02 (Communicable Diseases-Rabies), unless there is no rabies vaccine licensed and approved by the U.S. Department of Agriculture for that animal species.
 - Approved Species cattle, sheep, horses, dogs, cats and ferrets.
 - MDA does <u>not</u> require off-label use of the rabies vaccine.
 - Fairs and shows have authority to set their own requirements above and beyond state requirements.
- Documentation:
 - o CVI
 - Rabies Proof of adequate rabies vaccination on all required species shall be documented by the
 veterinarian administering the vaccine. This can be noted on the CVI or written on an approved rabies
 certificate that is issued by the veterinarian. Proof of vaccination should be presented at the time of entry
 with CVI and Self-Certification.

Anne Arundel County 4-H /FFA

Livestock Auction Committee (LAC) Rules and Regulations

Purpose: To bring all Anne Arundel County 4-H/FFA members together who have a Market Livestock Project for the purpose of promoting and organizing the Livestock Auction at the Anne Arundel County Fair to encourage the growth and expansion of livestock projects.

AUCTION MEMBER ELIGIBILITY:

- 1. To be eligible to sell in the Auction sellers must be a member in good standing of Anne Arundel County 4-H/FFA, abide by all rules and regulations of 4-H/FFA and Anne Arundel County Fair and LAC.
- 2. All sellers or any 4-H/FFA members considering a market project must attend their Club's/Chapter's scheduled Livestock Auction Committee Education Meeting unless special permission is granted by the 4-H Extension Educator or the FFA Advisor in advance.
- 3. Sellers must be present at the auction in order to sell, unless special permission is granted by the 4-H Extension Educator or FFA Advisor in advance.
- 4. The seller is responsible for uploading a personal biography including pictures for each animal onto the online auction platform, making sure that they thank last year's buyers by September 1st.

PRE-FAIR STEPS:

- 1. Sellers must weigh-in market animals at the official weigh-ins: second Saturday in January for steers and third Wednesday in May for all other market animals. New members and anyone who has an update to W-9, the form is due with the project registration papers at **either January or May** weigh-in.
- 2. All animals must meet MDA and USDA tagging requirements by weigh-in.
- 3. Sellers must follow all USDA requirements for withdrawal of feed additives and medications. Any project animal that must be treated for illness or injury, and that will not meet the drug withdrawal dates, should be removed from the Auction, and cannot be shown in 4-H/ FFA market classes.
- 4. All state health regulations must be complied with and will be strictly enforced. All male livestock market animals of beef cattle, dairy cattle, lambs, swine, and goats must be neutered and healed prior to 4-H/FFA weigh in and tagging. The only exception would be animals that have obvious signs that they have been banded however their scrotal sac is still intact.
- 5. Sellers should contact at least two new buyers every year. Buyers' names and addresses must be turned in to the LAC via Google Forms by May 1. The Buyers' letters must be turned in to the Livestock Auction Committee Box in an unsealed, addressed, stamped envelope for review at May Weigh-In. The sellers are requested to visit their prospective buyers to follow up according to the suggested marketing schedule.
- 6. All correspondence with buyers must be proofread and approved by the club leader, advisor, or Board of Directors prior to being mailed out.
- 7. A poster or sign thanking your previous year's buyer must be hung in their stall space prior to fair opening. Signs will not be written in pencil or ink.
- 8. All entries will be completed on time as stated in the 4-H/ FFA catalog.
- 9. Limit: Each exhibitor is only allowed to sell 2 steers, 2 pigs, 2 goats, 2 sheep and 1 turkey per exhibitor. The champion and reserve champion **market rabbit pens are required to sell**. If they show more than the limit to sell each exhibitor must confirm with their species chairperson which animals will sell at check in/weight in (no exceptions). If the animal is Grand champion and owned by an Anne Arundel County 4-H/FFA Member, then that animal must sell.
- 10. If a member is dual enrolled in both 4H & FFA, the member needs to choose which species are registered with each organization. Note that how an animal is registered may impact State Fair Registration as they do not recognize dual enrolled members. Ask your 4H Club leader or FFA Advisor for more information if needed.
- 11. All market lambs must be slick sheared prior to arrival at the fairgrounds.
- 12. Sellers and their families must sign up for at least 1 of the LAC assignments or sub committees.
- 13. Sellers and their families are encouraged to sell raffle tickets.
- 14. All sellers and their families are encouraged to participate in one outside sales promotion to help promote the Auction and the fair. These could be booths, meetings, or other opportunities the committee finds.

FAIR WEEK STEPS:

- 1. Upon arriving at the fairgrounds, exhibitors are responsible for checking in their animals prior to unloading. At check in you must submit (1) one photocopy of your Certificate of Veterinary Inspection papers and the completed Livestock Self Certification papers.
- 2. All sellers are responsible for having their market animals weighed in at the designated times by their Species Chairperson and the fair representative. Pigs, goats, sheep, **rabbits and turkeys** will be weighed in as they are unloaded between 3pm and 7pm. Weigh-in for steers will begin at 7pm.
- 3. If the minimum weight or rate of gain is not met on an animal, it may not be shown in 4-H/ FFA market classes or sold in the Auction. There will be no re-weighs. The following Rate of gain will be met per species per day in order to sell in the Auction:

(1) Swine: 1.4 lbs(2) Steer: 2.0 lbs(3) Sheep: 0.3 lbs

- 4. All animals must meet minimum weight and may not exceed maximum per species in order to sell:
 - (1) Swine: 220 lbs minimum weight and may not exceed 325 lbs maximum
 - (2) Steer: 1000 lbs minimum weight and may not exceed 1500 lbs maximum
 - (3) Sheep: 80 lbs minimum weight and no maximum
 - (4) Goat: 60 lbs minimum weight and no maximum
 - (5) Turkey: 20 lbs minimum weight
 - (6) Rabbits: 3 lbs. minimum weight and may not exceed 5.5 lbs each (Pen = 3)
- 5. All animals must be exhibited in the show ring by the 4-H/ FFA owners. Any request for exemption must be approved by check in date by the 4-H Extension Educator or FFA Advisor. If approved the animal may be shown by another 4-H/ FFA member of the same age or younger. In the event of sickness or injury after check-in, the case will be reviewed by the 4-H Extension Educator or FFA Advisor. Parents cannot show or fit or prepare the 4-H/ FFA member's animals.
- 6. Animals must be kept on their normal feeding schedule to prevent weight shrinkage or loss until they are loaded onto the trailers.
- 7. Sellers owning animals that do not meet the sale criteria will not place For Sale signs on their project animals until after the Auction is complete. Private treaty sales prior or during the Auction are prohibited. Anyone doing this will not be allowed to sell the following year. If any emergency or extenuating circumstance prior to fair prohibits you from selling your project at auction you need to find a buyer who is not a current customer of the LAC and with communication to the LAC.
- 8. 4-H/ FFA Uniform requirements: Each member will be required to wear the official uniform of their organization while showing and presenting their animal for the Auction.
- 9. All sellers are requested to work at the information/raffle sale booth for at least 1 hour during the fair week.

DAY OF AUCTION STEPS:

- 1. Reminders:
 - (I) Assist with set-up (3pm), dinner, tasks during the sale, and clean-up following the sale.
 - (II) Bring a case of soda to contribute to the Buyers' Dinner.
 - (III) Attend the pre-sale meeting at **4pm** Saturday in the Auction Dinner tent with a parent/quardian.
- 2. Be prepared and present to enter the sale ring with your animal at the appropriate time. Animals not ready to sell when called and miss their sale order will sell at the end of the auction for that species.
- 3. Grand and Reserve Champion animals will sell first in each species group. The remainder of the order will be chosen by placing order as determined by the LAC.
- 4. Any animal designated as "donated back" by the buyer during the Livestock Auction will be resold to a private livestock contractor at the end of the sale for fair market value. The proceeds from the sale will go back to the designated organization.
- 5. All sellers in the Auction will remain at the ring area until the conclusion of the auction. Sellers should be building up the crowd and available to assist wherever needed during the sale.
- 6. Any animal that is determined to not be in a showmanship condition will be refused entry into the sale ring until properly cleaned. Upon being properly cleaned, every attempt will be made to market the animal at the next opening after having been represented to the ring gate keeper. If the last animal has been

marketed prior to your returning with your cleaned animal you will have forfeited your opportunity to have your animal sold at the Auction. Animals may only be decorated with products that are non-toxic. Only approved animal products may be used. Decorated animals need to be washed clean prior to the conclusion of the fair.

- 7. The only awards allowed in the Auction ring are those showmanship and market awards won on the animal to be sold at that fair.
- 8. The Auctioneer has the final say on all bids.
- 9. If a seller asks a buyer for their animal to be returned to them, or if they ask for a buyer to give them an animal without purchasing it, they will automatically forfeit the sale of their animal and the purchase price will be returned to the buyer.
- 10. A 4H/ FFA member or their relatives cannot physically approach, distract, or interfere with someone actively bidding on an animal during the livestock auction.
- 11. Each seller is required to have his/her picture taken after the animal is sold the night of the auction. These will be used to produce the buyer's calendar. One picture per animal is needed.

AFTER THE AUCTION STEPS:

1. Members must create an acceptable thank you letter the day after the Auction which will be read and approved by the LAC. The thank you letters/cards must be turned in with envelopes and stamps between 1pm and 3pm on Sunday after the Auction or you will forfeit your auction check.

GENERAL RULES

- A. In the operation of the Anne Arundel County 4-H/ FFA Livestock Auction, the "Seller" is the 4-H/ FFA youth offering an animal for sale through the auction process. The "Buyer" is the party identified by the Auctioneer as submitting the highest accepted bid for an animal. The Seller and the Buyer enter into a contractual agreement when the Auctioneer declares the animal "SOLD." Both Buyer and Seller will affirm their contract by signing the Anne Arundel County 4-H/ FFA Livestock Auction Agreement at the time of purchase. If the Seller is a minor (under age 18 on the date of sale), the Seller's parent or guardian must also sign the Livestock Auction Agreement (contract).
- B. The Anne Arundel County 4-H/ FFA Livestock Auction Committee will serve as host and facilitator of auction sales. The Anne Arundel County Fair will provide auction facilities but does not assume any managerial or financial role in the auction. The Auction Committee will register Buyers/Bidders, provide auction management and administrative services, accept payments from Buyers, and issue payments (less fees) to 4-H/ FFA Sellers. In collecting and issuing payments, the Committee does not assume, accept, or limit the legal rights or obligations of the Buyer or the Seller.
 - FEES: The LAC will charge 5 % commission on each animal sold to be placed in the Anne Arundel County 4-H/ FFA Livestock Auction fund. Funds raised from the commission will be used for maintaining the livestock scale, promotional costs (including pictures, buyers' correspondence and advertisements), sale expenses, livestock facility improvements, hauling of animals and other expenses deemed necessary by the committee.
 - 2. If a sale animal dies after the auction but before being processed at the plant the buyer will be contacted and given the choice of a replacement animal of like quality and size or their money refunded. The LAC fund will contribute up to \$2500.00 for the replacement of the animal. If the replacement cost is more than \$2500.00, the seller will be responsible for the difference (difference to be withheld from sellers proceeds). If the buyer chooses to be refunded, the buyer will be refunded from the sale proceeds and the seller will be paid from LAC fund for the sale cost of the animal, payment not to exceed \$2500.00. The replacement of the animal or money refund will be handled by the Species Chairperson, 4H Extension Educator, FFA Advisor, and the LAC President.
 - 3. If a sale animal is condemned in the slaughter process (because of disease, use of medicine, infection, etc.) it is the seller's responsibility to absorb the loss. The buyers will be refunded their money.
 - 4. Under no circumstances will a seller whose sale prospect dies or becomes sick or injured to the point of being unable to show or has been otherwise termed as unfit, be allowed to sell in the

- Auction.
- 5. The LAC does not guarantee the sale of any animal. Every effort will be made to market each animal while in the auction ring.
- 6. Market animals that do not sell through the auction may be transported with the sale animals to the processors if there is space on the trailer. They have to let the checkout table staff know during the auction, and they pay \$30 per hog, \$15 per sheep or goat, and \$385 per steer. This must be paid by the conclusion of the auction.
- 7. If the funds in the LAC treasury are low, a Fundraiser may be required to rebuild the funds. In this case all sellers will be required to participate.
- 8. All grievances with the Anne Arundel County Fair 4-H/ FFA Department (AACF4-HD) must be submitted to the AACF4-HD via the 4-H Educator or FFA Advisor in writing. A \$50 fee, paid to the Anne Arundel County Fair, must accompany the written grievance. During the fair, grievances will be reviewed by the grievance committee within 24 hours of receiving the written complaint. The grievance committee shall always consist of the 4-H Educator or FFA Advisor, the Barn Chairman, and the species chairman, the Fair President, and a 4-H or FFA Member. The committee may also include the Fair Week Manager, the 4-H Club Leader, FFA Advisor, and other species chairmen as appropriate. The grievance committee shall have a minimum of 5 members present to vote. If a grievance is submitted outside of fair week, the issue will be reviewed at the next regularly scheduled meeting. The decisions of the committee shall be final and binding. Should the protest not be sustained, the \$50 fee will be forfeited to the Anne Arundel County Fair.
- 9. Payment for animals sold at the Auction will be mailed to the seller after payment has been received from all the buyers.
- 10. In the event of an emergency or unforeseen circumstances, the LAC committee can alter the rules and regulations for the benefit of the Auction by a ¾ majority vote.
- 11. If a Buyer fails to pay their invoice, the Livestock Auction Committee will make a good faith effort to collect the monies owed, through communication with the Buyer. The Livestock Auction Committee is under no obligation to pursue legal recourse or collections through legal channels against non-paying Buyers. If good faith efforts to collect payment fail after 3 months, the Anne Arundel County 4-H / FFA Livestock Auction Committee will cease collection efforts and offer to pay to the Seller the fair market value of the animal. The amount of payment will be determined according to the September USDA Report and will not exceed \$2,500.00 per animal. This payment in no way limits the rights of the Seller to individually pursue legal claims or collection actions against the Buyer. If the Seller accepts the fair-market-value payment from the 4-H/ FFA Livestock Auction Committee and later receives full or partial payment from the Buyer under their auction sale contract, the Seller must promptly return to the Livestock Auction Committee the fair-market-value payment that the Livestock Auction Committee made to the Seller.

BEEF CATTLE RULES & REGULATIONS

- Market Steer must be born after March 1 of the previous year. Steers must meet the minimum weight of 1,000 lbs. and be under the maximum weight of 1,415 lbs.
- 2. All beef animals must be weaned except cow/calf class.
- 3. ALL SHOWS WILL BE UNFITTED. Animals can only be washed and blown out with NO adhesives, show foam, agents, paints, oils or other fitting aids allowed to prepare cattle for show. Exhibitors ARE allowed to use hair and skin care products and conditioners (such as Revive, Kleen Sheen) as part of the regular daily grooming and hair maintenance of their beef cattle while at the Anne Arundel County Fair. Animals may be subject to being wiped with a white towel, cloth, etc. as they report to the show ring.
- 4. All purebred animals, except market steers, must have registration papers checked, or be shown in commercial class.
- 5. Classes will be divided by age, weight, and/or breed; as deemed necessary by the shower chairperson.
- 6. All beef cattle MUST be secured by a neck rope, in addition to a halter, while in the stall.

POULTRY RULES & REGULATIONS

- 1. 4-H Poultry competition will be open to the five (5) Southern Maryland Counties.
- 2. All birds must be Avian Flu and Pullorum tested and banded, and an original copy of test papers to be held until after the show. For information on testers, contact MDA Animal Health Division at (410) 841-5810.
- 3. Notice: All species of fowl entered will be subject to daily inspection by a representative of the Maryland Livestock Sanitary Service (MLSS). Any bird showing symptoms of disease will be disqualified and be removed immediately from the building for the duration of the Fair and isolated as directed by the MLSS Representative. Such birds may not return to the building for the duration of the Fair.
- 4. Be sure to state whether entry is for large fowl, bantams, ducks, geese, pigeons, turkey or pheasant. If not they will be entered as large fowl and judged that way.
- 5. Give name and variety as shown in the American Poultry Association "Standard of Perfection".
- 6. Management is not responsible for loss by fire or otherwise but will exercise all vigilance in the case of exhibits and the police arrangements of the grounds.
- 7. 4-H members are encouraged to enter the same bird in both the OPEN and the 4-H Departments of the County Fair.
- 8. The greatest care will be taken of all specimens but the Fair will not be responsible for any accidents, mistakes, loss or damage from whatever arises. The specimen being exhibited is at the sole risk of the exhibitor.
- 9. Specimens will be fed, watered and cared for by the poultry department volunteers...
- 10. Judging will be by comparison & governed by the American Poultry Association "Standard of Perfection" and all specimens shall be exhibited in their natural conditions, with the exception of game and game bantams. Any violation of these rules shall exclude the specimen from competing and cause the withholding of the premium awarded to the owner of such birds.
- 11. No advertising cards or inscriptions will be allowed on coops until after judging has been completed.
- 12. No pairs or trios will be shown.
- 13. Any violation of the rules and regulations will result in the forfeiture of premiums awarded to the exhibitor.
- 14. All poultry carrying crates must be removed from fairgrounds after check in. Carrying crates CANNOT be stored on fairgrounds.

RABBIT RULES & REGULATIONS

- This is not an ARBA Show, but all exhibits must be a breed recognized by ARBA. Mixed breeds are not allowed. The
 book, "Standard of Perfection" outlines the standards for each recognized breed. It can be ordered online at
 www.arba.net or by calling (309-664-7550). Exhibitors are responsible for obtaining and knowing which breed and
 color, and variety of rabbit they own.
- Any exhibit displaying signs of disease or in poor condition will be refused entry. The decision of the Chairperson is final.
- All 4-H rabbits, must be tattooed in the left ear, prior to being entered in the fair.
- 4. Rabbits that are under 3 months or over 2 weeks pregnant will not be allowed.
- 5. Rabbit competition will be open to the 5 Southern Maryland County 4-H members.
- 6. The Fair will supply feed and litter, but you must provide feeders and waterers for your rabbits. Rabbits will be fed and watered by the Rabbit Department volunteers.
- 7. The Fair will take the greatest care of all exhibits, but the Fair will not be liable for any accidents, loss or damages. **THE EXHIBITORS ENTER AT THEIR OWN RISK**
- 8. All cages must be swept by the owner at the end of the show or premiums will be withheld.
- 9. An exhibitor will be limited to 2 entries in each class regardless of breed.
- 10. Rabbits exhibits will be judged according to the Livestock Premium Schedule.
- 11. The Market Pen consists of 3 rabbits that are all the same breed & variety, mixed breeds are not allowed. Age restriction: not over 69 days old as of fair check in day. All breeds will compete together.
- 12. All rabbit carrying crates must be removed from fairgrounds after check in. Carrying crates CANNOT be stored on fairgrounds.

- Market lambs will be shown by weight, not by breed.
- 2. Market lambs must under 1 year of age.
- 3. Market lambs must weigh at least 80 lbs.
- 4. Classes will be divided by age, weight, and/or breed; as deemed necessary by show chairperson.
- 5. Ewe lambs shown in breeding classes are not eligible to be shown in Market classes.
- 6. Both lambs shown in Market Lamb Pair may be shown in Market Lambs and must be owned by the same person.
- Only wether and ewe lambs may be shown in market classes. Breeding animals, stags, and rams are not eligible.
 Animals showing evidence of stag characteristics, unhealed scrotum and testicle development will be disqualified.
- 8. Any animal with an open wound as a result of tail docking may not be shown.
- 9. Bred and Owned Classes: Exhibitors in the Bred and Owned Classes in animal divisions must be the breeder and the first and continuous owner of the animal entered. "Breeder" is defined as the recorded owner of the dam at the time of breeding/service. "First Owner" is defined as the recorded owner of the dam at the time the animal was born.
- 10. All sheep must be properly presented for show. Market lambs must be slick shorn prior to their arrival at the fairgrounds.
- 11. No artificial coloring may be used on any part of any animal regardless of class.



RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE 4-H/FFA INDOOR EXHIBITS

Superintendent: Arnelle Quashie/Joy Sim

Only Online Pre-Entries are accepted. Online registration through Martech/Blue Ribbon is on the <u>Anne Arundel County Fair</u> Website. 4-H entries MUST use the "4-H Fair Book". Martech/Blue Ribbon closes *August 28, 2025*.

- 1. Entries must be the work of the Exhibitor (unless otherwise noted) and have been created within 1 year of show (Sept 2024 Sept 2025) and not exhibited in a previous year's Anne Arundel County Fair.
- 2. No entry fee is required in the 4-H/ FFA Indoor Entry Department.
- 3. All active members of 4-H and FFA in Anne Arundel County may submit work carried on since the last Anne Arundel County Fair. We will accept entries from the 5 Southern Maryland counties.
- 4. <u>All entries must be pre-entered</u> online using the link on the <u>AAC Fair website</u>. Registration opens *July 15, 2025* and closes *August 28, 2025*. Computer-printed entry tags will be available to you prior to fair or when you drop off your entries. Each exhibit must be tagged and recorded to be accepted for judging.
- 5. All **Indoor Exhibit Entries** must be submitted (brought to the indoor building and tagged) Sunday, September 7, 2 pm 5 pm; All Indoor Exhibits but NO Food entries accepted Monday, September 8, 2 pm 7 pm; All Indoor Exhibits accepted (including food)
- 6. All entries must be removed from the Fairgrounds between 2 7 pm on the Monday after the Fair closes. The 4-H/FFA Department will not assume responsibility for any articles remaining after 7pm.
- 7. No exhibitor can enter more than one article in any one class.
- 8. Your 4-H and FFA Membership Card or Clover Wristband is your entry into the Fair.
- 9. All premiums due to youth exhibitors from the Anne Arundel County Fair are mailed directly to the exhibitor. This includes premiums due from Shows, Contests, and indoor building exhibits. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to claim any premiums due. Those not claimed/cashed are subject to the premium rule under the General Rules and Regulations in the AAC Fair catalog.
- 10. "Clover" aged 4-H youth classes (youth ages 5-7 years old on January 1, 2025) in the 4-H Department: No advance registration required. Youth bring exhibit entries on regular 4-H Entry Days (many prefer to bring items in a decorated box). Youth share info about their projects in person and then receive one ribbon for their entries (entries are not judged). If there is a misrepresentation of age, the exhibits will be disqualified.
- 11. Exhibitors who do not obey rules, and/or behavior expectation standards of the Maryland 4-H/FFA Program will be subject to appropriate disciplinary action as established in the Code of Conduct in effect for each organization. 4-H/FFA members who are disciplined and removed from the fair forfeit all premiums.
- 12. The judges will give placings up to 3rd place in each class. Unless otherwise noted in section, exhibits will be judged in one of the 4-H age divisions: Junior (ages 8-10), Intermediate (ages 11-13), Senior (ages 14-18). Entries not conforming to the class description and/or division/section rules and regulations will be disqualified.
- 13. Awards: Ribbons will be awarded to first through third. Premiums are as follows: first \$5, second \$3, third \$1. Rosettes will be awarded to the Junior, Intermediate, and Senior Champions and Reserve Champions in each section, if there are sufficient entries as determined by the superintendent.
- 14. Anne Arundel County 4-H is a participant in the Anne Arundel County Fair. Refer to the 'Fairgrounds and Exhibitor Rules and Regulations' regarding Premiums, Awards, Judging, rules, and the appeal process for more detailed information on these topics.

4-H INDOOR EXHIBITS

All indoor exhibits must be pre-registered using the information provided in the 4-H catalog on the <u>AAC</u>
<u>Fair Website</u>. All Indoor Exhibit Entries must be submitted at the AAC Fairground Indoor Exhibit Hall, 4-H Department. Exhibitors and exhibits must comply with the "Anne Arundel County Fair Rules & Regulations", "General 4-H Rules & Regulations", these "Division Rules & Regulations" and the applicable "Section Rules & Regulations".

HOME ENVIRONMENT

Section Rules & Regulations:

- 1. An Exhibitor may exhibit in a class above their age level, but not below.
- 2. All entries must be the work of the Exhibitor and completed within the year, except for Bedspread, Quilt or Comforter class.
- 3. At the discretion of the judges, entries will be disqualified if they are not considered functional items used in a home environment. Craft/wooden items are not allowed in this section.
- 4. Judging criteria: quality of workmanship; usefulness/functional home use items; color and design application; personal creativity; cleanliness.
- 5. Framed pictures must be ready to hang on the wall or stand independently on a solid surface. Taped hangers are not acceptable.
- 6. A wall hanging is a free flowing, flat fabric based on original or pattern creation. It is intended to be suspended by a rod or dowel. Usually layers of fabric are applied to develop the design. A wall hanging is meant to be seen from a distance either inside or outside and to serve as an accessory to the home or room. Embellishments include beads, feathers, and other items that serve to enhance the overall fabric design. All wall hangings should have a rod pocket, extender tabs or rings for hanging.
- 7. Group Entries must be entered under the name of only one of the group members.
- 8. Store-bought pillows will not be accepted.

- 1. This section is open to all youth currently enrolled in the 4-H Expanded Foods and Nutrition Program (EFNEP). This exhibit provides the opportunity for 4-H Members to share nutrition knowledge and concepts gained in EFNEP programs with others.
- 2. Posters must be created by the Exhibitor. Posters must be designed on or affixed to **standard poster board (14" x 22")** and must contain a nutrition message.
- 3. Exhibitors may use any media: water color, ink, crayon, acrylic, charcoal, oils or collage. Posters may not be three-dimensional.

 Posters must be 14" x 22" and contain a nutrition message. Cartoon figures, such as Snoopy, Barney, etc., cannot be used because they are copyrighted.
- 4. The following information must be printed on the upper left-hand corner of the back of the poster: Exhibitor's Name, Age, Phone #, 4-H County/City, Theme and Interpretive Statement.

Division Rules & Regulations:

1. All exhibits must be clean and free of labels and tags, unless otherwise specified in the section rules or class description.

PHOTOGRAPHY

Section Rules & Regulations:

- All photos must be at least 5" x 7" in size and not larger than 11" x 14", except sequence/story classes, which should be a minimum 4" x 6", maximum of 5" x 7" in size. (Example: buildings, flowers, people)
- 2. All photos must be mounted on a firm mat weight board using spray adhesive, heat seal or other permanent mounting med, no tape. Use pre-cut mat if needed. Poster Board and Foam Core is not acceptable. Do not frame the photos and do not use clips of any kind. Photos may be mounted horizontally or vertically. Mat size should correspond to photo size:
 - Photo: 5" x 7" Mat: 8" x 10"; Photo: 8" x 10" Mat: 11" x 14"; Photo: 11" x 14" Mat: 16" x 20"
- 3. Do NOT cover photos with plastic, cellophane, or ANY other covering.
- 4. The following information must be printed on the <u>upper left-hand corner of the back</u> of the mount: Exhibitor's Name, Age, 4-H County/City. A white 3" x 5" card must be taped to the top, back, right corner of the mount. The following information must be <u>typed</u> on the card: Title of Picture; Date Picture Taken; Name of Camera; Type of Camera; Kind of Film Used.
- 5. The entry tag should be attached with string and taped to the back to hang on the right side (top front) of the photo.
- 6. **Judging:** composition; storytelling ability; photo quality; developing & printing; mounting.

WOODWORKING AND METALWORKING

- 1. A plan, blueprint, working drawing or sketch used in construction, must accompany each exhibit, along with a statement of intended use. Enclose all documentation in an envelope printed with the Exhibitor's name, age, phone #, 4-H County/City and class. Attach envelope to exhibit with string or tape. Notes: Birdhouse plans must state the species of bird for whom the house is designed. A "before" photograph along with a statement of intended use, must accompany each exhibit in the "refinishing" class.
- The maximum size is 3' x 6' x 5'. Where indicated in class description, LD is "largest dimension" and SD is "smallest dimension".
- 3. All restoration entries must be entered in those respective classes. All kits should be entered in the kits classes in the crafts and hobbies department. Kits are defined as an exhibit assembled or made from pre-cut pieces whether it is a commercially purchased kit or the exhibits are pre-cut for a workshop and then assembled by 4-H member. All exhibits in the other classes must be made of worked wood (cut, shaped, etc.).
- 4. Special note regarding Birdhouses: Birdhouses with perches attract unwanted, non-native birds such as House Sparrows and European Starlings, that are more aggressive than our native birds such as the Bluebird. Currently, these non-native birds are primarily responsible for the decline of many of our native cavity-nesting species. This note does not apply to decorative birdhouse classes.
- 5. Judging Criteria: Design and Plan; Workmanship; Choice of Wood; Suitability and Quality of Finish; Usefulness.

WELDING CRAFTSMANSHIP

- 3. Welds shall not be ground or filed to improve their appearance.
- 4. Articles may or may not be painted to show them at their best advantage.
- 5. Used articles must be clean. Dirt will be cause for disqualification.
- Judging criteria shall include: workmanship (including weld quality, squareness and fit of joints and finish), overall design, originality and usefulness.
- 7. A limit of one entry per class will be enforced.
- 8. Juniors are not permitted to enter Welding Projects.

- 3. Educational Displays may not exceed the size of a standard tri-fold display board and must be sturdy enough to stand on a table without support. The following information must be printed on the upper left-hand corner of the back of the display: Exhibitor's Name, Age, Phone #, 4-H County/City.
- 4. **Judging:** The judges will give placings up to 3^{rd place} in each class. Unless otherwise noted in section, exhibits will be judged in one of the 4-H Age Divisions: Junior (ages 8-10); Intermediate (ages 11-13); Senior (ages 14-18). Entries not conforming to class description and/or division/section rules & regulations will be disqualified.
 - a. Collections will be judged on accuracy in naming and grouping by order, variety of species, neatness in labeling and neatness in display.
 - b. Displays will be judged on accuracy and completeness of information, neatness, design and educational value.

NATURAL RESOURCES

- 1. Exhibitors may only enter 1 exhibit per class. Due to limited exhibit space, collections are limited to one display case per class entered. Case dimensions may not exceed 25" x 30". Photos may be used to indicate the size/scope of collections too large to exhibit in their entirety.
- 2. Collections should include items collected from nature and identified as to common name, scientific name and state, region or country where collected. NOTE: Senior exhibitors must include additional information appropriate to the collection (e.g. where specimen is grown or found, native vs. non-native collection, dollar value of timber sales for various trees, etc.)

ENTOMOLOGY

Section Rules & Regulations:

- 1. Exhibitors may enter 1 general collection in the appropriate class and may also enter a collection in classes: Q29, Q30, and Q31. Exhibits in these classes must be separate from the general collection.
- 2. Most specimens should be collected and mounted by the exhibitor. Insects must be mounted according to the instructions in the 4-H Entomology Project Guide, 4-H 225. Insects of the same order should be grouped together. Specimens must be mounted on standard insect pins.
- 3. Limited specimen trading is allowed as long as the original collector's label is retained. If Exhibitor is a previous Entomology Exhibitor, a substantial number of new specimens should have been collected during the previous year. All new specimens collected since last year's fair should be identified by placing a straight pin with a colored head by the insect. Do not use these pins to pin the insects!
- 4. Each collection must be accompanied by a 3" x 5" card identifying the number of specimens in the collection, the number of orders in the collection, and the number of specimens collected since last year's fair.
- 5. One or more boxes with pinning bottom may be used. Boxes should be at least 5" x 8" in size and covered with glass or other transparent top.



- 3. **Open** booths may feature any theme promoting 4-H. Be sure the message and theme are clear.

Size and Construction:

- Exterior booth dimensions must be: 47" W x 36" D x 22" H.
- The sides must be in the shape of a right triangle using the following dimensions: 22" tall x 36" long/deep.



3. ID CARD:

- Identification card must be typed not handwritten. Font size minimum 16pt.
- Card should be (business card size) 2"x3.5" in size and displayed horizontally.
- Securely attached to the bottom board, on the right front corner.
- The ID card must include the Club/Chapter Name and the county.
- Missing ID Cards will result in disqualification.

Booth Details:

- Nothing in the booth may be taller than the sides of the booth where the item is placed.
- No Electrical hookups will be provided.
- Structure MUST be constructed of durable materials that will look good for the duration of the fair.
- Booth items MUST be securely fastened to prevent damage, loss or to prevent items from shifting if moved. Booths are often relocated after they are dropped off, if items shift due to poor design they will be left where they fall.
- Failure to comply with these instructions may cause the booth to be disqualified and not receive a premium.

5. Booths MUST Display:

- Booth Title
- Minimum of one OFFICIAL 4-H Clover must be displayed.
- Suggestions: Use readable font choices and sizes, make sure to use proper clover and crest in readable formats, colors and sizes. This is
 marketing/promotional display, make sure to highlight your organization. When displayed can we tell who is promoting this booth and what for? Be
 creative with placements of logos, text, graphics, and 3-dimensional items.

Section Rules & Regulations:

1. CLASSES:

- 1. There are two classes offered: Open (CBN 00001) and Themed (CBN 00002).
- 2. Themed banners shall use the following theme for 2025: "Blossoming with 4-H". Future theme is as follows: 2026 "4-H: Ready for Work and Life", 2027 "4-H: Ready Then, Ready Now, Ready for Anything"
- 3. **Open** banner may feature any theme promoting 4-H. Be sure the message and theme are clear.

2. Pre-Entry:

• Each 4-H Club may only enter 1 banner.

3. Size and Construction:

- Banner dimensions must be **50**" wide and **38**" tall. Failure to comply with dimensions will cause the banner to be disqualified and not receive a premium.
- Banner must be constructed to hang on a pole. The opening for the pole should to be a minimum of 3", and is included in

the overall size of 38" long. Bring your own pole.

- Banners may be constructed of any type of durable material. Must be able to be folded or rolled.
- Appliqué and embroidery are suggested applications. The design must be on one side only.

4. Banner MUST Display:

- Banner Title
- Minimum of one OFFICIAL 4-H Clover must be displayed.

5. **ID CARD**:

- Identification card must be typed not hand written. Font size minimum 16pt.
- Card should be (business card size) 2"x3.5" in size and displayed horizontally.
- Securely attached with safety pins, sewn, or glued on the back side of the banner on a bottom corner.
- The ID card must include the Club Name and the county.
- Missing ID Cards will result in disqualification.
- 6. **Judging:** Banners will be judged on their own merit and receive a rating of "Excellent", "Very Good" or "Good" using the following criteria and score sheet:

One reserve champion banner will be selected from each class (A & B) and will receive a rosette and an additional \$13 premium, if enough entries.

4-H PROMOTIONAL POSTERS - Open (TPT 00003)

Section Rules & Regulations

- 1. Entry Qualification:
 - Each 4-H member may only enter 1 poster per class.
- 2. Size and Construction:
 - Posters must be exactly 14" x 22" and may be horizontal or vertical.
 - Posters must be drawn on or affixed to standard poster board and must be two-dimensional. Exhibitors may use any med. including: marker, crayon, acrylic, oil, ink or collage.
- 3. Posters will be divided into two classes:
 - There is one class offered: Open (TPT 00003).
 - **Open** posters may feature any theme promoting 4-H.
- 4. Posters MUST Include:
 - The OFFICIAL 4-H Clover emblem.
 - The following information must be printed on the upper left-hand corner of the back of the poster: Exhibitor's Name and 4- H County/City.
- 5. Judging:

Posters will be judged on their own merit and receive a rating of "Excellent", "Very Good" or "Good" Entries not conforming to class description and/or division/section rules & regulations will be disgualified.

- 6. Awards:
 - Excellent \$2, Very Good \$1, Good Ribbon. Champion and Reserve Champion will receive rosettes, if enough.

4-H PROMOTIONAL Graphic Art Design – County 4-H (GAO 00001), Maryland 4-H (GAO 00002), and Open 4-H (GAO 00003).

Section Rules & Regulations

- 1. Entry Qualification:
 - Each 4-H member may only enter 1 design per class.
- 2. Size and Specifics:
 - Designs may not be larger than 8" x 10" and may be horizontal or vertical.
 - Designs must be computer generated. Final file types can be: jpg, png, pdf, esp, or psd.
 - All artwork created must be original, do not use images or photos from the internet.
 - Suggested software to use could be Photoshop, Microsoft Publisher, or related.
 - Final Graphic Art Designs should be:
 - Printed on 8.5" x 11" Heavy White Card Stock/Coated Papers or 8" x 10" photographic paper. Glossy and matte finishes are accepted.
 - All Designs must be mounted on a firm mat weight board. Designs must use an 11" x 14" mat. Use pre-cut
 mats if needed. Note: Files such as jpg can be printed at local 1-hour photo shops.
 - Be creative with the design, use readable fonts, send a clear message.
- 3. Graphic Art Designs will be divided into three classes:
 - Classes offered: A) County 4-H (GAO 00001), B) Maryland 4-H (GAO 00002), and C) Open 4-H (GAO 00003).
 - **County** create a design promoting your county 4-H program.
 - **Maryland** create a design promoting the Maryland 4-H program.
 - Open create a design promoting any 4-H project area, your 4-H club, or 4-H in general.
- 4. MUST Include:
 - Include a minimum of one OFFICIAL 4-H Clover emblem.
 - The following information must be printed on the back of the poster: Exhibitor's Name and 4-H County/City.
- 5. Judging:

Designs will be judged on their own merit and receive a rating of "Excellent", "Very Good" or "Good" Entries not conforming to class description and/or division/section rules & regulations will be disgualified.

- 6. Awards:
 - Excellent \$2, Very Good \$1, Good Ribbon. Champion and Reserve Champion will receive rosettes, if enough entries.

4-H CLUB SCRAPBOOKS (TCSB 00001)

Clubs may enter one scrapbook per club, per year. Name of club must be on the front cover of the book. The same book may be entered year after year, but **current year's update must be in a separate divided section each year with a minimum of five pages added per year**. All information must be in clear protective coverings. If clubs enter the same book yearly, current year's additions will be judged. However, all information must be included. Must include "AA Statement" and proper clover emblem somewhere on book cover.

IUDGING CRITERIA:

- 1. 25% HISTORY OF CLUB FROM DATE OF BEGINNING TO CURRENT YEAR This is the who, when, and how of how the club got started. Include officers, members, leaders, and other information pertaining to history as well as how club name was chosen.
- 2. 25% PICTURES OF CLUB Pictures reflecting club activities, officers, ceremonies, etc.
- 3. 15% ORGANIZATION OF BOOK The scrapbook should be organized and in a logical order.
- 4. 20% CLUB PLANS FOR FUTURE Include plans to ensure the future of the club for years and members to come and a yearly club planning calendar to provide Education, Fun Activities, Leadership and Service.
- 5. 15% EXPANDABLE COVER The cover can be made of any design, materials and originality counts, but needs to be expandable for future additions and must be sturdy as the public will want to see your history display.

4-H CLUB SERVICE PROJECT (TCSP 00002)

This is a club project, not an individual project. Only clubs may enter this class and any awards will be paid to the club, not an individual. Your entry may list several projects but will be judged as one. Acknowledgement can and should be made to the individual who came up with the idea and those who actually led the project. The display must be on a free-standing display board and be readable from a distance of 10 feet. It must include pictures and descriptions.

4-H CLUB GARDEN (TCG 00003)

Clubs and/or teams are encouraged to adopt a new or keep their existing garden/flower area. Please check with Joan Mauritzen (410) 255-4213 to let her know that you will be participating in this on-going project. This project/contest is being put in place to showcase your garden area as well as the fairgrounds on a year-round basis. Premiums will be the same as other club projects and will be made payable to the club, not the individuals.

Guidelines:

- 1. April-October monthly visits to maintain your area, keep it free from weeds, trash, etc. and planting of flowers.
- 2. If you have an area next to any building no trees may be planted due to maintenance and overtaking by tree roots, branches, etc. It is best to check with Fair President, Joan, or 4-H staff before planting trees anywhere on the grounds. When contacting these people please know where and what kind of tree you want to plant.
- 3. When planting your garden, please be aware of evading species that could spread and take over other areas.
- 4. Fair President or designee will check gardens at a set time each month to see that they are up to par. We will send everyone a schedule of work days and check updates once established. A point system will be established for judging and sent to all.
- 5. Fair/4-H is not responsible for the loss of plants, decorations, or anything else that is used in gardens.
- 6. Please make note that plants may need to be watered during the hot dry months. When stopping by the fair please check in at the office to let someone know you are there, so that you don't accidently get locked inside the gate.
- 7. Plan workdays, watering, etc. with the fair schedule. Many weekends the fairgrounds are rented and you will not be able to access your garden area.
- 8. Bring your own tools to work with, including a garden hose for watering. Once you receive your garden area you will be given a chart with location to nearest water hook up and mulch pile for your use.
- 9. Use of fair equipment is prohibited (tractors, golf cart, etc.) unless you make prior arrangements with the fair staff certified to run the equipment.
- 10. Once you receive your garden area it is up to your club/group to maintain it. It will remain your area until you tell Joan otherwise, or you continually do not maintain it, upon which time it will be reassigned.
- 11. Each garden area should have a small sign stating the club name/team. The 4-H office upon request will supply a small laminated AA statement sign for your garden.


